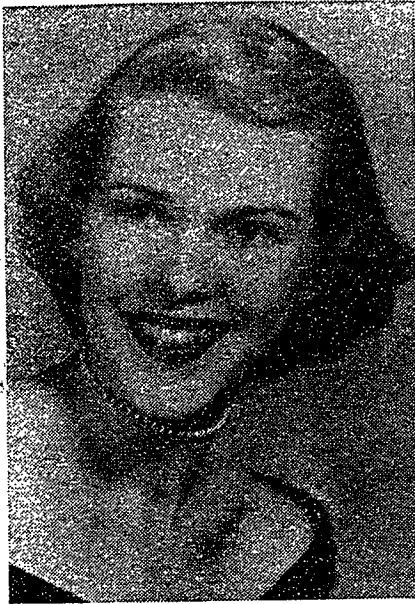
Approximately 160 invitations to the dinner have been sent to outstanding women on campus. Tickets are \$2.75.

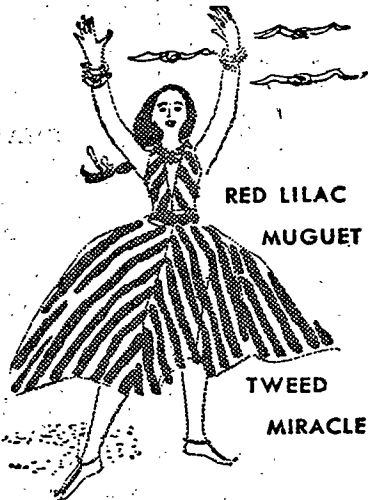
The discussion will be held in Osmond Laboratory following the main event, the panel on "The Miracle Fabrics Bring Their Own Problems."

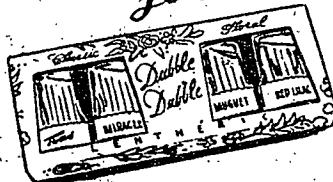

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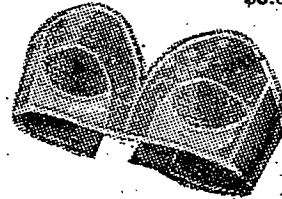

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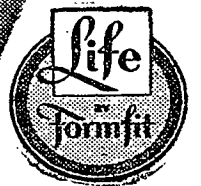
