

Two Students Win 1st Place In Ag Contest

Robert Hierr fifth semester animal husbandry major, and John Coble, third semester animal husbandry major, were first place winners in the professional and amateur divisions of the Livestock Judging Contest Saturday.

Hier received a total of 523 points to win the professional title for the second consecutive year. Coble won the amateur title with a total of 375 points. Sixty-eight students competed in the contest sponsored by the livestock judging team.

Other place winners and their points in the professional division were Donald Maurer, second, 519; William Sipple, third, 511; John Graham, fourth, 492; and Lester Hallman, fifth, 486.

Amateur place winners and their points were Ronald Harrod, second, 351; Larry Hilgendorf, third, 347; Thomas Armstrong, fourth, 346; and Georgene Huber, fifth, 323.

High scorers in the classes of the amateur division and their points were Coble and Robert Hartley, beef cattle, 100; Armstrong and Morris Brown, horses, 97; John Tait, swine, 100; and John Sink, sheep, 100.

In the professional division, high scorers and their points were Hier, reasons, 170; Maurer, placings, 368; Hierr, cattle, 145; Wilmer Harris and Robert McDowell, hogs, 140; Earl Hower and Maurer, horses, 126; and Sipple, sheep, 130.

Awards will be presented to winners at the annual Block and Bridle Banquet following the Little International Livestock Show April 25.

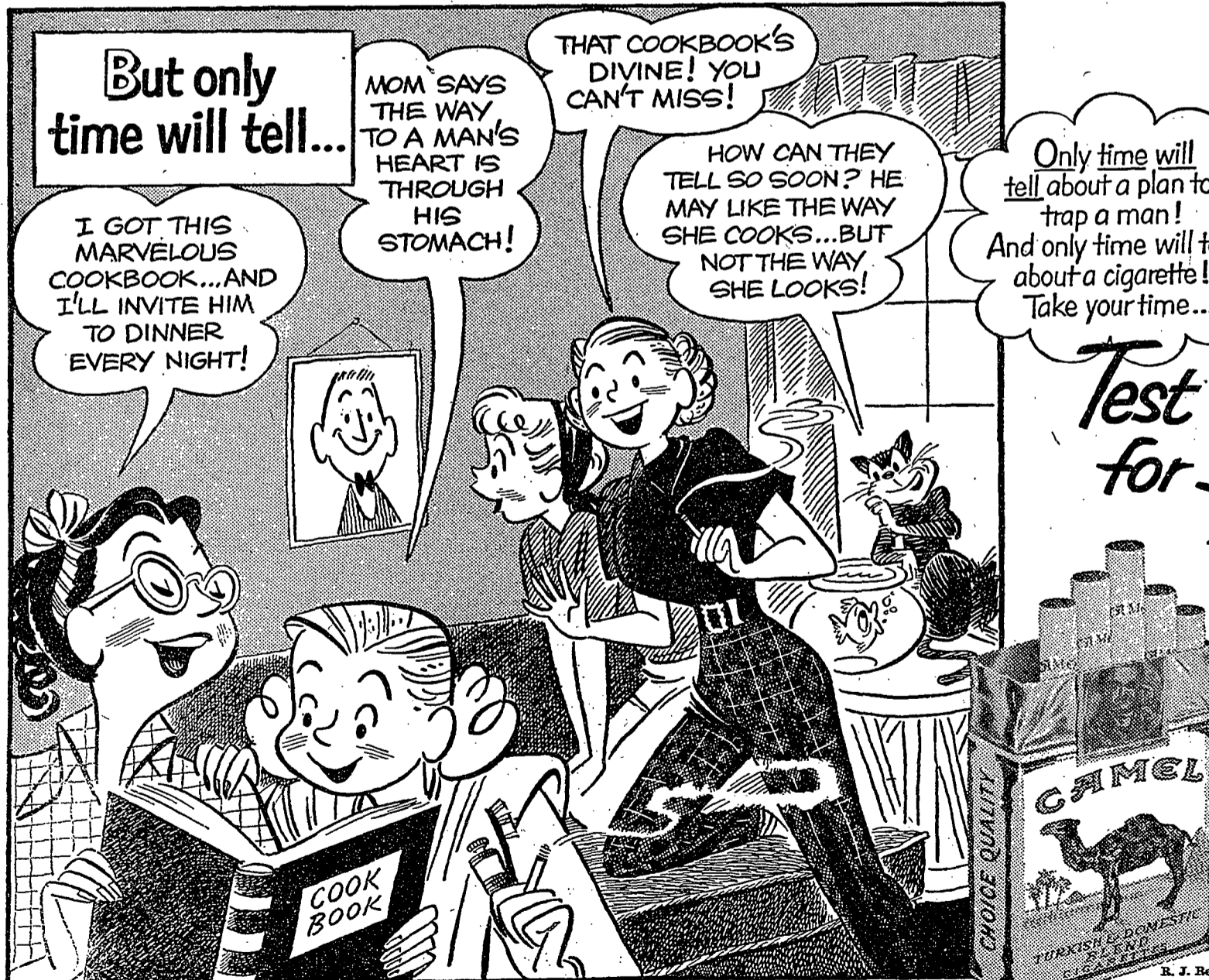
