Vet School Bill 'Inadequate'

"One million dollars is not enough to set up a School of Veterinary Medicine," Dean Lyman E. Jackson of the School of Agriculture said last week.

A bill appropriating \$1 million for the establishment of a vet school at the College was introduced to the state legislature earlier this week. Jackson has pointed out that between \$6 and \$7 million would be needed for a veterinary school.

The joint state government committee of the legislature has reported that the establishment of another veterinary school at this time would be impractical. A similar school exists at the University of Pennsylvania.
