

Prizewinners Named In Judging Contest

Sixty-two students participated Saturday in the dairy cattle judging contest sponsored by the Dairy Science Club. Prizes will be awarded Saturday at the Club banquet at the Lutheran Student House.

Winner of the professional division, open to students who have taken dairy judging courses, is Harry Roth, president of the Dairy Science Club, with 660 points.

In the professional division, David Morrow and Levis Phipps tied for second place with 632 points each. Fourth place winner was Darwin Braund, with 606 points, while fifth place went to Larry Hartman, with 586 points.

John Harris was first in the amateur division with 430 points. Joseph Very came in second, with 414 points, and Eugene Hellerick was third with 405 points.

Top judges for individual breeds in the professional class were: Aryshires—Braund, first; Morrow, second; John Carpenter and Richard McFeely, tied for third. Holstein—Roth, first; Braund and Phipps, tied for second; Clarence Hassler, third.

Brown Swiss—Edgar Fehnel, first; Morrow, second; William Waters and Braund, tied for third. Guernsey—Waters, first; Phipps, second; Roth, third. Jersey—Roth, first; Morrow and William Oliver, tied for second; Phipps, third.

In the amateur division top judges of individual breeds were: Aryshires—Glenn Elder; Holstein—John Sarikianos; Brown Swiss—Harris and Robert Hodge, tie; Guernsey—William Sipple; and Jersey—Harold Melchor.

Twenty-five students entered the amateur division, open to all students who have not taken judging courses.
