Spend Weekend Here **U.S.** Intervention In Asia Possible

Says Knowland Air, Naval Power May Be Necessary

WASHINGTON, May 6 (P)—Sen. Knowland (R.-Calif.) today advised Secretary of State John Foster Dulles "not to foreclose the possibility of using our air and naval power" if it should prove necessary to stop Communist aggression in Southeast Asia.


The Californian offered this advice as Dulles appeared before the Senate Foreign Relations Com-mittee in support of the administration's proposed \$5,800,000,000 foreign aid bill.

Dulles said the United States has started talks with several Allies on a possible appeal to the United Nations for action to deal with the Communist-led invasion of the Indochinese state of Laos.

He said flatly, however, that this country had no plans to send American troops to fight the Communists in Southeast Asia.

Much of the questioning was taken up with the invasion of Laos by Communist forces. Senator after senator expressed concern that loss of Southeast Asia to communism would be a staggering blow
