

140 to Receive Navy Training

Nearly 140 students enrolled in the Navy ROTC program at the College will participate in cruises or special active-duty training programs this summer, Capt. Rowland H. Groff, professor of naval science, has announced.

Sixty students will leave July 13 from Norfolk on cruises to Edinburgh, Scotland, and Oslo, Norway, or Bergen, Norway, and Copenhagen, Denmark.

Twenty-seven students will sail July 20 on a cruise to Colon, Panama, and Trinidad.

Forty-two midshipmen will participate in three weeks of amphibious training at the Naval Amphibious Base, Little Creek, Va., and in three weeks of aviation training at Corpus Christi, Tex. Nine students seeking commissions in the U.S. Marine Corps will receive special training June 22 to Aug 1 at Quantico, Va.
