

## Lane to Speak To Art Grads

Howard Lane, professor of child development at New York University, will address the Spring Conference of the Graduate Club in Art Education 2 p.m. Saturday in the Temporary Classroom Buildings. The conference will be held at the College tomorrow and Saturday.

Theme of the conference is achievements and directions in art education. It is organized to provide opportunity for the exchange of ideas and experiences in art education.

The conference will begin tomorrow with an open house exhibit in the Temporary Classroom Buildings. Derwin W. Edwards, head of the Department of Art Education at Miami University, Oxford, O., will give the opening address at 2 p.m. Five dissertations on graduate studies in art education will be presented by students who have attained doctorates.

A dinner and entertainment by a creative dance group will conclude the conference. An exhibit of work by graduate students in art education is being held at Schlow Gallery in conjunction with the conference. The exhibit, including paintings, ceramics, textiles, and craft work, will be open until Saturday.

Perry Yocum, sixth semester chemistry major, was elected president for the 1953-54 school year.

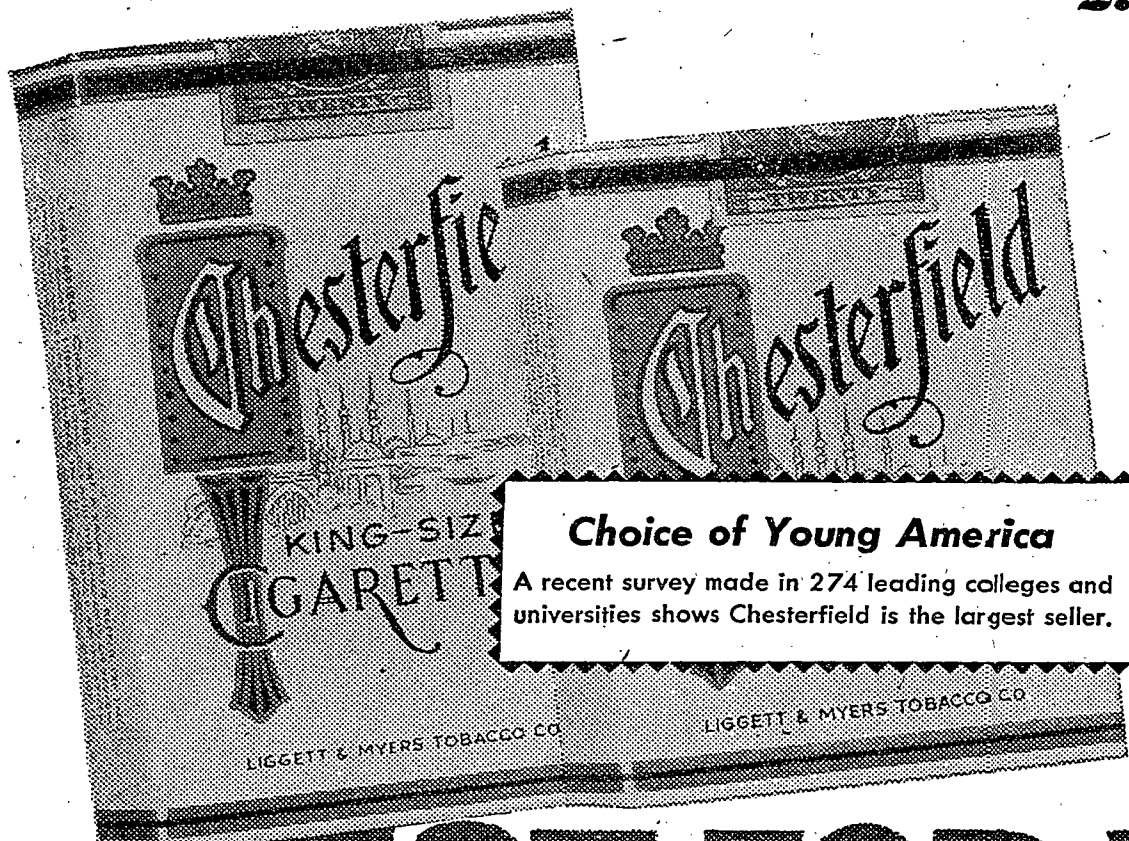
