

NEW CAMPUS GATEWAY, a gift of the Class of 1903, was dedicated this summer on the 50th reunion of the class.

The gateway, on the corner of Atherion street and Pollock road, was presented to the College by George W. Deike, a member of the Class of 1903 and vice president of the Board of Trustees.

The gateway consists of two pylons of lime-stone, each 22 feet high. Sculptured heads of the Nittany Lion are mounted near the tops of the pylons. Curved walls of native stone flank the columns and simple limestone benches have been constructed inside the curved walls.
