

Four IM Wins Posted

A Dave Pine lateral to Dick Pearson, who then threw to Bob McMillan, scored the only and winning touchdown with three minutes remaining as Delta Tau Delta topped Alpha Gamma Rho, 7 to 0, in the opening game of the '53 IM football tourney.

Other winners in the opening night's program were Phi Kappa Psi over Theta Xi, 1-0, Tau Kappa Epsilon over Sigma Phi Alpha, 6-0, and Alpha Zeta over Beta Sigma Rho, 6-0.

Delta Tau Delta started its winning drive after returning an AGR punt to the 50. Two pass plays brought the ball to the 26 yard line, and set the stage for the Delta's winning tally. McMillan, whose kicking kept the Delta's in the game, ran 15 yards to paydirt after taking a Pearson forward. Pine threw to Lozaw for the extra point.

AGR's final scoring opportunity was lost when McMillan inter-

cepted a forward. Delta Tau kept possession the remainder of the game.

Phi Kappa Psi topped Theta Xi in overtime, 1 to 0. Jack Winterbottom caught a third down pass to bring the Psi's into Theta Xi's territory and victory. The Theta's final chance to win was downed with a desperation last down pass.

The winners had a golden chance to score in the opening period. A 65 yard pass from Bob Jordan to Doc Rostmeyer brought the ball to the losers 10. Here the Theta Xi defense tightened and no score resulted.

A 60-yard pass play from Ben Harvey to Jack Klein was all that was needed as Tau Kappa Epsilon topped Sigma Phi Alpha, 6 to 0. Klein took Harvey's pass on the losers 20 and outraced the final defenders for the decisive 6-pointer.

Harvey, playing the fullback post in the TKE's spread box for-

mation, was outstanding on offense. His passing continually kept the Sigma's with their backs to their goal.

The final game of the night saw Alpha Zeta defeat a stubborn Beta Sigma Rho team, 6 to 0. With two minutes remaining, Don Miller connected with a 50-yard pass to John Milsome, and the game's only score. Miller played fine ball throughout, while the Beta's two platoon system failed to pull the game out of the fire.

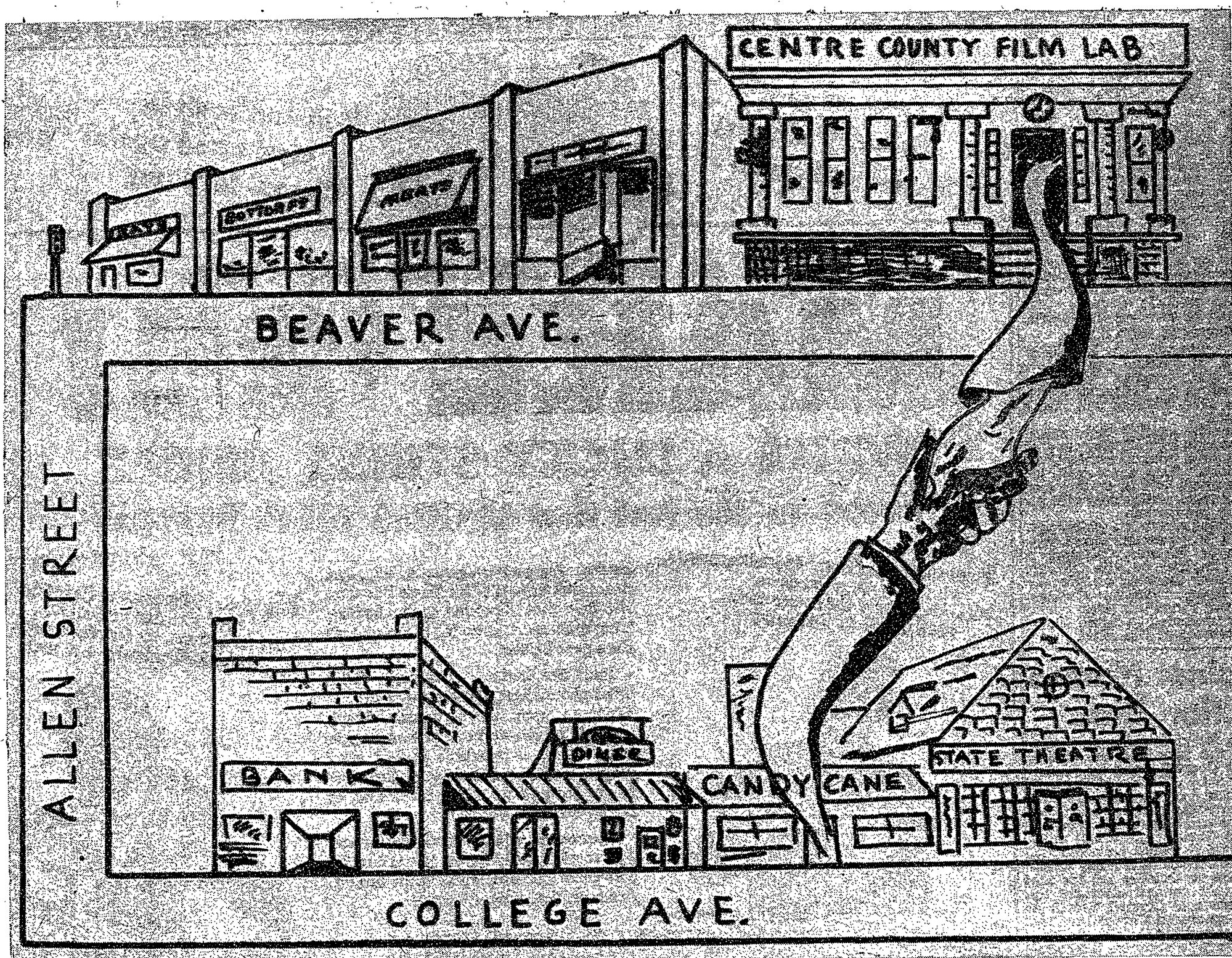
up the 42-point victory. The Orangemen, who conquered the Blue and White last season, 25-7, tallied four touchdowns in the final chapter.
