ization for utilization, correspond regularly with regional and national offices, make arrangements for delegations to regional and national meetings, serve as resource and information person to any person or group who can make use of NSA programs and materials, and explain policies delegates will be voting upon at regional assemblies and national congresses to cabinet.

A recommendation, presented to cabinet by George Richards, Spring Week chairman, that May 12, 1954, be set aside as a student holiday for the Spring Week carnival was tabled by cabinet because no final date has been set for Spring Week. Approval of the administration is necessary for Spring Week plans this year.

Three proposals recommended by Richards were approved. One of these gave \$2500 from last year's profits to the Penn State Student Scholarship Fund. Another \$250 was allocated to buy permanent facilities such as auxiliary electrical equipment. The remainder of the profits, \$4128.57, will be used as working capital for this year's Spring Week.

The Liebig Society, a bio-chem honorary, will meet at 7:30 in Hillel Foundation lounge.


Alpha Epsilon Delta, pre-medical honorary, will hold a business meeting at 7:30 in 103 Willard.

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
