

Kenworthy, Fehnel Support Student Encampment Program

Wilmer E. Kenworthy, director of student affairs, and Edgar Fehnel, seventh semester animal husbandry major, told the Faculty Luncheon Club yesterday they have great confidence in the student leaders' encampment program.

Fehnel, who was in charge of this year's encampment at Mont Alto, said he was impressed mainly with the "informality and congeniality with which students and faculty members discussed matters."

The idea for the encampment came from Kansas State University in 1949, Fehnel said, and after three years of research Penn State held its first encampment.

Recommendations of the encampment are passed on to All-College Cabinet, Fehnel explained. Some of these recommendations are now in effect on campus, he pointed out.

Kenworthy said he thought one

of the big advantages of the encampment is that it's held before classes begin. He pointed out that this was important since during the semester students have difficulty attending meetings.

Although faculty and staff members were present at the encampment, Kenworthy emphasized the fact that it was a student project.

Only one mistake was made by those in charge of this year's encampment, Kenworthy said. That was that the students "outlined too big a program." Thirteen workshops were held.

Secretariat To Study Constitution

A survey of the constitutions of All-College Cabinet-recognized organizations will be the first project of the new Cabinet Secretariat when it is established, Robert Smott, campus National Student Association coordinator, told cabinet Thursday night.

The study is part of the campus program, Smott said, to implement a resolution, passed at the National Student Congress this summer. The resolution seeks to minimize misunderstanding in the college community by mutual recognition and respect of areas of campus jurisdiction.

The constitutions would be surveyed from a standpoint of contradiction to the All-College Constitution, general constitutional form, and style, Smott said.

More study is necessary before a restatement and confirmation of previously delegated authority and responsibility, as recommended by the resolution, can be brought before cabinet, Smott said.

Penn State is among the leading contenders for the NSA sub-commission on student leadership, Smott said.

Charles McClintock, seventh semester petroleum and natural gas engineering major, was named by All-College President Richard Lemyre to the NSA sub-commission on leadership training.

Otto Hetzel, fifth semester arts and letters major, and Lorraine Gladus, seventh semester arts and letters major, were named to the committee established Oct. 1 to reorganize Cabinet Projects Council into Cabinet Secretariat.

Donovan Gets Post

George L. Donovan, manager of associated student activities, has been named regional representative in the Association of College Unions. He will represent Pennsylvania, Maryland, West Virginia, New Jersey and Delaware.

dents again created disturbances in several hotels in Philadelphia, into early hours of the morning, and did considerable property damage," he said.

College officers are now working with the hotels involved in an effort to identify the students involved, Eisenhower told his audience.

"This time there was not a victory to celebrate," Eisenhower stated. "This was therefore not an outburst of student enthusiasm. It was sheer rowdyism," he said.

"I know that members of the faculty and administration—and most students—have been saddened by the behavior of the small student minority," he said.

"We are too realistic to expect perfection," Eisenhower stated,

"but I am sure we all aspire to instilling in students those concepts and convictions which will motivate them, among other things, to the observance of acceptable standards of conduct in the community."

Eisenhower then offered suggestions to improve the situation. "I am suggesting then," he said, "that in our instruction, in individual and group counseling and advising, and in informal relations between teachers, administrators, and students, all of us maximize our efforts to help students develop not only specialized knowledge, but also fundamentally sound traits of character, a deep understanding of moral values, a sensitivity to the feelings and rights of others, and an appreciation of their group responsibility to conduct themselves in ways that reflect credit on all who make possible the great advantages they attain here."

Frosh Rioter Will Be Tried By Tribunal

A freshman who took part in the Sept. 28 demonstration in the West Dorm area will appear before Tribunal at 7:30 tonight in the Student Government room, 204 Old Main.

Charges against the student are expected to be similar to those upheld in the case of three senior men who appeared before Tribunal Tuesday. These students were placed on office probation in the Dean of Men's office for inciting further violence by heckling and refusing to cooperate with student leaders.

Eleven cases of traffic violations deferred at the last Tribunal meeting will also be reviewed.

Dean of Men Frank J. Simes was not available yesterday for comment on the charges that would be advanced against the freshman.
