The group recently entertained Alpha Epsilon Phi in the suite.

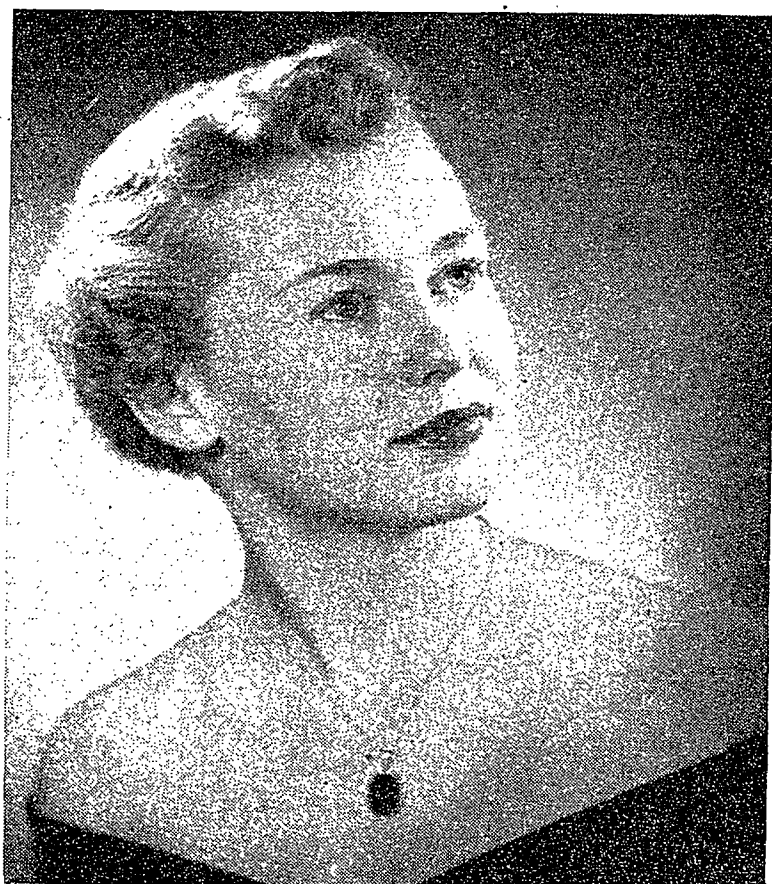

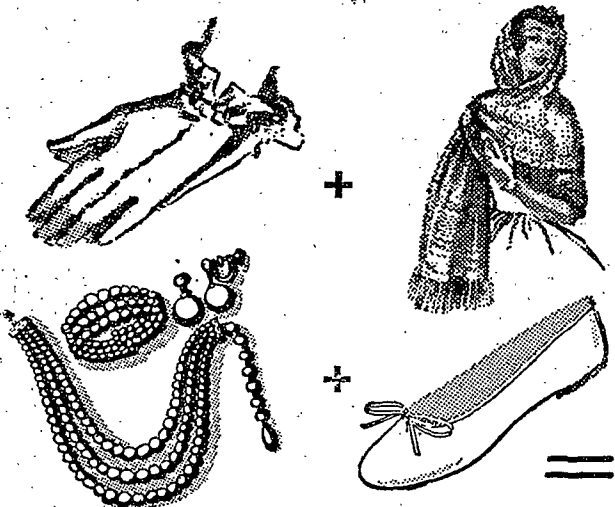
