

Lion Frosh Meet Navy Gridders

The Penn State freshman grid-ders will try to turn the heat on Navy, along with snow-laden cold blasts, when they face the Middies at 10 a.m. today at Annapolis.

All this, of course, weather permitting. It is not known whether the snow, which caused postponement of yesterday's Lion-Navy soccer match, will force the game to be canceled or put off to a later date.

State will try to improve on its 19-9 loss to Pitt two weeks ago. They showed a lot of class for three periods, only to be caught from behind by a strong Panther squad.

The Sailors' record, while not outstanding, is deceiving. The Plebes succumbed to tough Maryland, 13-6, then reversed the score the following week against Penn. Last week, Navy tied Bullis Prep School, long a supplier of Navy varsity teams, by a 14-14 count.

The Nittany board of strategy is hoping that two weeks of practice have corrected Lion flaws, the most glaring of which was State's defense against Pitt punt and kickoff returns.

State will use much the same starting lineup as in the first game. Jack Arnst and Jack Fry will open at ends, with Ned Finkbeiner, Ignatius Hokay or Jack Calderone at tackles. Dick DeLuca and Ron Downie are guards, with Sam Valentine at center.

In the backfield, Milt Plum will be at quarterback, Ray Alberigi at left half, Jim Lockerman at the other halfback slot, and either Stu Wiggins or Dick McMillen at fullback round out the backfield.

When West Virginia beat Penn State this season it was the first time that the Southerners defeated State and Pittsburgh in the same year.
