A large blue and white banner spelling "Harvest Ball" will be at the entrance. At the far end of the hall will hang a dark blue backdrop covered with silver musical notes and decorations. A blue background with silver musical notes banded in blue and white will furnish a background for Johnny Nicolosi and his orchestra.
