A religious institute on the subject "International Aspects of Student Life" will open with a dinner from 5:30 to 8 tonight in the Hotel State College. Members of the planning committee for the institute, the board of directors of the Penn State Christian Association, and the PSCA cabinet will attend the dinner.

Brass Quartet Will Precede Choral Concert

A double brass quartet will play chorales tomorrow from the tower of St. Paul's Methodist Church for a half hour before each performance of the State College Choral Society's Christmas program.

The choir will present selections by Bach at performances at 3:30 and 7:30 p.m. Fifteen students will be among the 166 participating in the fifth annual concert.

The concert will include choruses and duets from the Kyrie, the Gloria, and the Sanctus, sections from the Mass in B minor.

A chorale choir and the chorale players will sing chorales and recitatives from the Christmas Oratorio. A chamber orchestra will accompany the singing.

Mrs. Dorothea Roscoe, organist, will play two chorale preludes for organ.

A few free tickets are still available. They may be obtained at the Student Union desk in Old Main, Blair's Gift Shop, the Harmony Shop, Keeler's Book Store, and the College Book Store.

Seats will be reserved for ticket holders until 15 minutes before the performance begins.

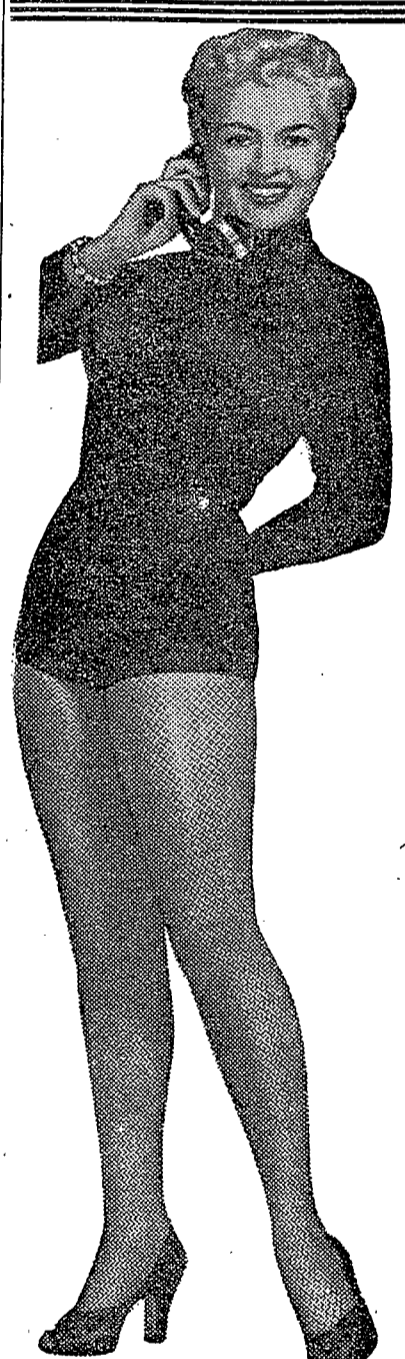
Sigma Pi

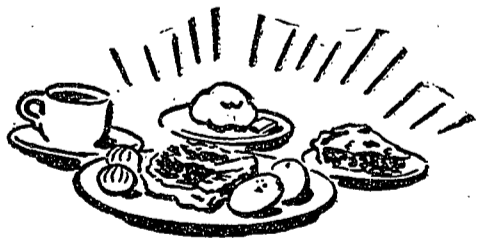
