menting on the fact that departments were not renamed "schools," said the department still remains the basic academic and administrative unit in nearly all universities. This will continue to be the case at Penn State, he said, but the possibility exists that in the future a relatively few fields which encompass more than one department may later be named "schools."

Other divisions of the University which received changes in title in accordance with the court act of Nov. 13 which made the former college The Pennsylvania State University included University Library, University Health Service, University Placement Service, The Pennsylvania State University Centers, and the University Senate.

Titles of positions approved at the monthly meeting were President of the University, University Librarian, University Editor, Director of the University Health Service, University Physician, Assistant University Physician, Director of the University Placement Service, and Associate Director of the University Placement Service.

Also Assistant Director of University Farms, University Marshall, University Scheduling Officer, Assistant University Scheduling Officer, University Examiner, Assistant University Examiner, University Auditor, and University Chaplain.

Import Lists Are Due Today

Lists of imports to be housed in approved fraternities over Military Ball weekend must be submitted to the Dean of Women's office by noon today, O. Edward Pollock, assistant to the dean of men in charge of fraternity affairs, has announced.

Notice of a social event must be filed at both the offices of the dean of men and dean of women at the same time, he said.

On the list of imports, each woman's name, full home address, and name of escort must be reported, and must be accompanied by a letter of acceptance from chaperones.

Pollock said a new policy has been established to allow the Dean of Women's office to approve or disapprove the registration lists.

The Dean of Men's office will accept the dean of women's decision. Pollock said the only reason for disapproval would be that the social event notice was received too late for posting in the women's dormitories and for informing chaperones.





