the report stated. Both the training of leaders in science and society, and training in group responsibility should be functions of the University, the report added.

Recommendations from the committee for further study to arrive at an educational philosophy for the University were accepted by the Senate.

The following special committees were appointed: committee on selection of freshmen, committee on educational research, committee on general education, and the committee on improvement of instruction.

Four standing committees of Senate will present reports to the committee on educational policy. A final report on educational policy will then be submitted to Senate for approval.

"O-2. No student shall be exempt from a final examination except by approval of the head of the department and the dean of the college in which the course is offered."

"O-3. . . . All examinations shall be adequately proctored. Any case of dishonesty shall be reported to the student's dean through the head of the department and the dean of the college in which the dishonesty was committed."

"O-4. A student who is absent from a final examination for a cogent reason may have his grade deferred upon authorization of
