

# Wrestlers Open Phi Kappa Sigma 28th Campaign, Tops Intramural Seek 30th Win Race For Crown

Penn State's unbeaten and National Collegiate wrestling champions will launch their 28th campaign under veteran and colorful coach, Charlie Speidel, when they open the 1954 campaign against once-beaten Cornell Saturday night.

The Nittany Lions, who will be seeking their 30th straight win, will open the first part of a scheduled doubleheader at 7 p.m. The Penn State-Colgate basketball game will follow.

Like the Lions, Cornell has been weakened via graduationmuch more so. Lost are its two Eastern and NCAA champions-Frank Bettucci, 157-pounder, and Don Dickinson, 167-pounder. fill Nevertheless, the Big Red were strong enough to post two wins thus far this season.
