

Notre Dame Seeks Lions As '56 Foe

According to a release yesterday by the Associated Press out of Cincinnati, Notre Dame is seeking a football game with Penn State University for 1956 to be played in Philadelphia's 100,000 seat Municipal Stadium.

Ed (Moose) Krause, Notre Dame athletic director, told the Philadelphia Bulletin's Frank Yeutter that the Irish apparently were going to be dropped from the Penn schedule in 1956 because of the new round robin Ivy League setup.

Krause was quoted as saying Notre Dame needs an eastern game each year and Penn State would be a good opponent.

Yeutter wrote that Krause intended to approach his "good friend," Rip Engle, Penn State head coach, to talk about a 1956 game between the two universities. Notre Dame and Penn State met in football in 1928 on Franklin Field.

A game with Notre Dame in Philadelphia would appeal to Penn State, a Nittany spokesman said, in any season when Penn State is not on Penn's schedule and provided it is a date when Penn is playing away.

Penn and Notre Dame are scheduled to meet next fall and in 1955, and Krause says agreement had been reached for 1956. However, Notre Dame would step aside in 1956 if the Ivy League round robin becomes an actuality which apparently is about to happen. Penn has indicated it would prefer to card Navy, Army, and Penn State in its non-league games.

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Spartans, Badgers, Syracuse Highlight Nittany Boxing Card

Although tryouts for the 1954 boxing squad are only engaged in their third day of sparring sessions, one issue is probably very prominent in their thoughts—the schedule. And well it might be, with such former pugilistic powerhouses as Michigan State, Syracuse, and Wisconsin carded to meet the Lions.

A quick rundown of some of the accomplishments of these three teams, and the other four squads which are listed to complete the seven dual meets for 1954, will prove the size of the task for which Coach Eddie Sulkowski and his men must prepare.

The Lions will open their competition with Michigan State. Two one-point losses were the only dark spots on the Spartan's record last year during seven dual meets. Coached by George Markris, the Michigan Staters lost their first to Minnesota, 4½-3½, and then bowed to Wisconsin five matches later, 4½-3½.

1952 NCAA Champ

Speaking of the Badgers of Wisconsin, who won the National Collegiate Athletic Association title in 1952 on their home grounds but placed second last year in the same tourney, they will be State's third opponent. Idaho State College copped the tourney honors last year when the annual event was held there.

Coach Sulkowski, now in his

fifth season at the Nittany boxing helm, will take his squad to Madison, Wis. for the match. Wisconsin's 178-pound NCAA champ, Ray Zale, was awarded the individual trophy at last year's tourney.

College Park, Md., will be the scene of the Nittany contest where the Lions will be entertained by the Maryland Terps. Last year, the Terps narrowly edged the Lions, 4½-3½, for one of its three wins.

The Big Orange of Syracuse will visit Rec Hall Feb. 13, promising to display similar boxing grandeur which has won it the Intercollegiate Boxing Association title for the past five years. Syracuse won three of the eight individual titles, and also had three runnersup in the '53 Eastern classic.

After Syracuse, Penn State will face Wisconsin, Virginia, Army, and Louisiana State. These matches will be away; the Virginia University match, originally

scheduled for Rec Hall, was changed after a request from Virginia.

Defeat Lions

Virginia, coached by Albert T. York, will be hoping to defeat State again after squeaking out a 4½-3½ win last year. Charlottesville, Va., will be the scene of the 1954 IBA tourney.

Although Army posted a meager chart of 3-4 last year, they managed to defeat Penn State, 5-3 in both team's final dual meet.

Coach James Owen's mittmen of Louisiana State University will be a newcomer to the Lion card. Last year his team posted a 2-2-1 record.

Frosh Cagers Lose 2d Game To JVs, 46-36

Whatever goes up must come down, and in basketball the ball is supposed to come down between the hoops on the two banking boards at either end of the court. This tricky little deed was the most elusive characteristic in Wednesday night's 46-36 victory by the junior varsity over the freshman cagers.

Time and time again the ball went up. It always came down too, but usually in the wrong place. The peak of futility came in the third quarter when the frosh missed 20 of 22 shots.

Overall, the yearlings hit on 13 of 61 shots for a 21 per cent accuracy. The JV's fared better, hitting on 18 of 61 for 30 per cent efficiency. From the foul line the freshmen hit on 16 of 38 and the JV's connected on 12 of 23.

Joe Hartnett paced the freshmen with nine points and Pete Lang led the JV's with 11 markers.

The JV's took a 10-8 lead after one period and watched their lead increase and dwindle—mostly increase—from time to time. This was the second victory for the JV's in two meetings with the frosh.

Billy Conn Indicted On Assault Charge

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 7 (AP)—A grand jury indicted Billy Conn, former light-heavyweight boxing champion, today on an aggravated assault and battery charge growing out of a street fight.

Melvin H. Cummings, Pittsburgh auto dealer, was indicted on charges of assault and battery in the same fight and another fight involving Conn's brother, Jackie, last November. The grand jury indicted Jackie, also a former boxer, on an aggravated assault and battery charge.

Cummings brought the charges against the Conn brothers and they in turn charged him.

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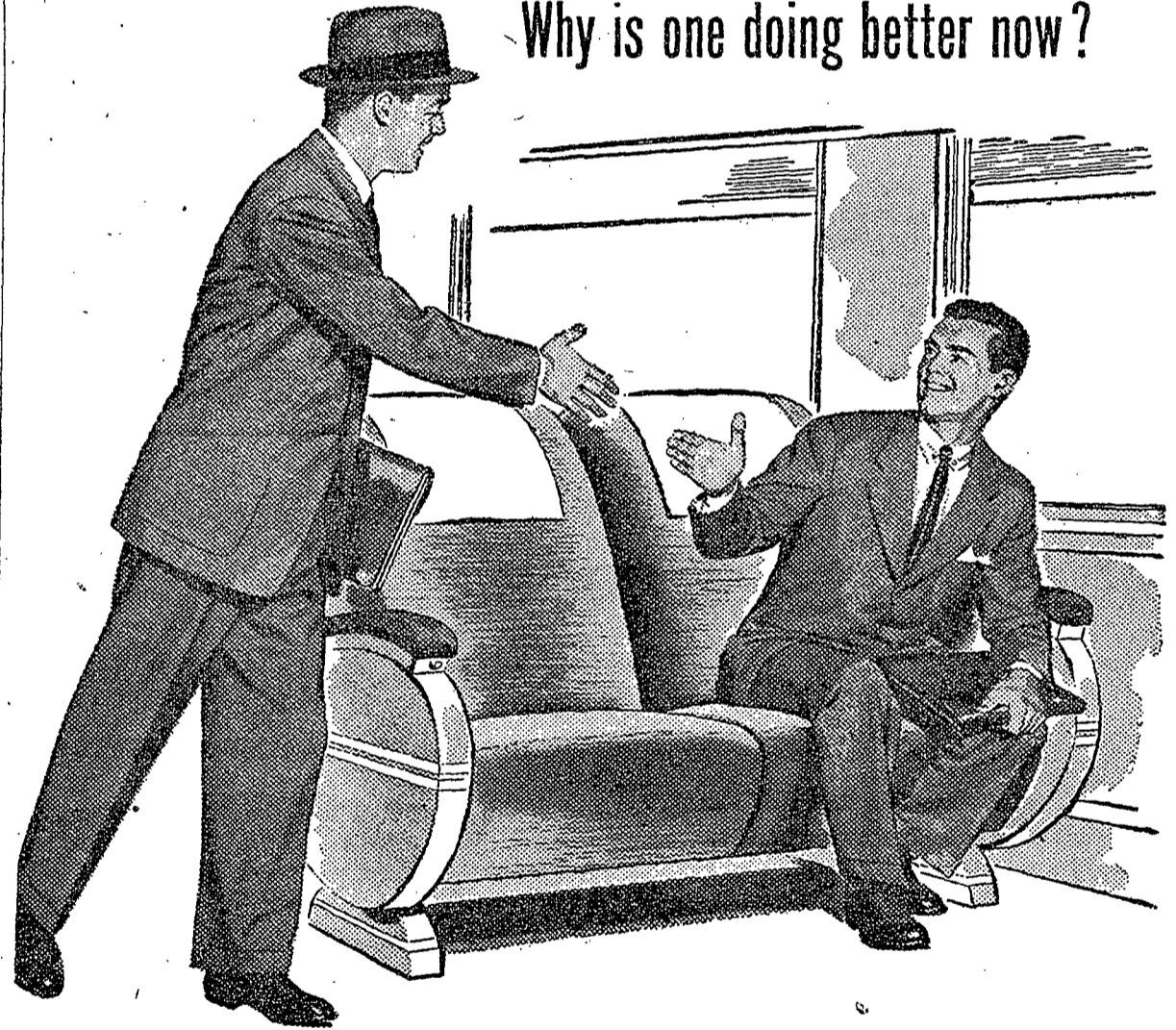
