The presidential rotation clause

The presidential rotation clause now in effect provides that the office pass from sorority to sorority in order of chapter founding on campus. The modified rotational presidency clause would require that the sorority in line for the Panhel vice presidency submit to a screening board a maximum of five candidates for the position. At present, the vice president automatically becomes president the following year.

Board Will Select

The screening board, which would consist of the five council Dean's Wife Plans officers, would make final selection of a vice president from the New York Concert candidates submitted for conideration.

The amended clause provides that the sorority in line for the presidency would be given a grace period of one year, if the screening board could not select a candidate.


