

## New Minimum For Pre-Vets Is Two Years

The new pre-veterinary curriculum approved Thursday by the University Senate will permit students to complete the minimum requirements for admission to veterinary schools after two years of study, Alfred L. Bortree, head of the Department of Veterinary Science, said yesterday.

Bortree said that although students are encouraged to spend three years of pre-veterinary study to gain a broader agricultural background, it is believed that the University should make it possible for the student who is otherwise qualified to meet veterinary school requirements in two years.

Another feature of the new curriculum, Bortree explained, is that students will have a broader choice of electives among courses not specifically required for admission to veterinary school. More even distribution of courses in livestock and poultry will also be possible, he said.

The new curriculum will go into effect during the fall semester.

About 75 students are enrolled in the pre-veterinary curriculum.

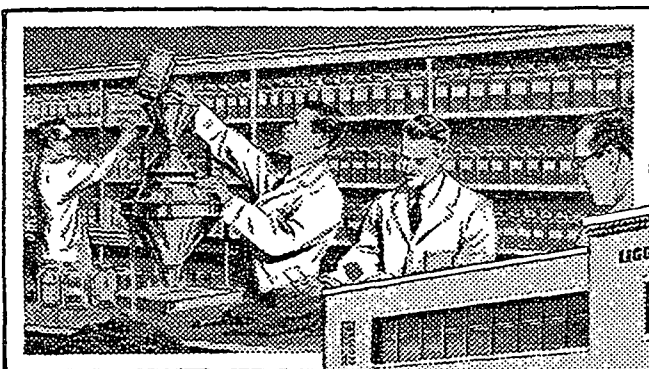

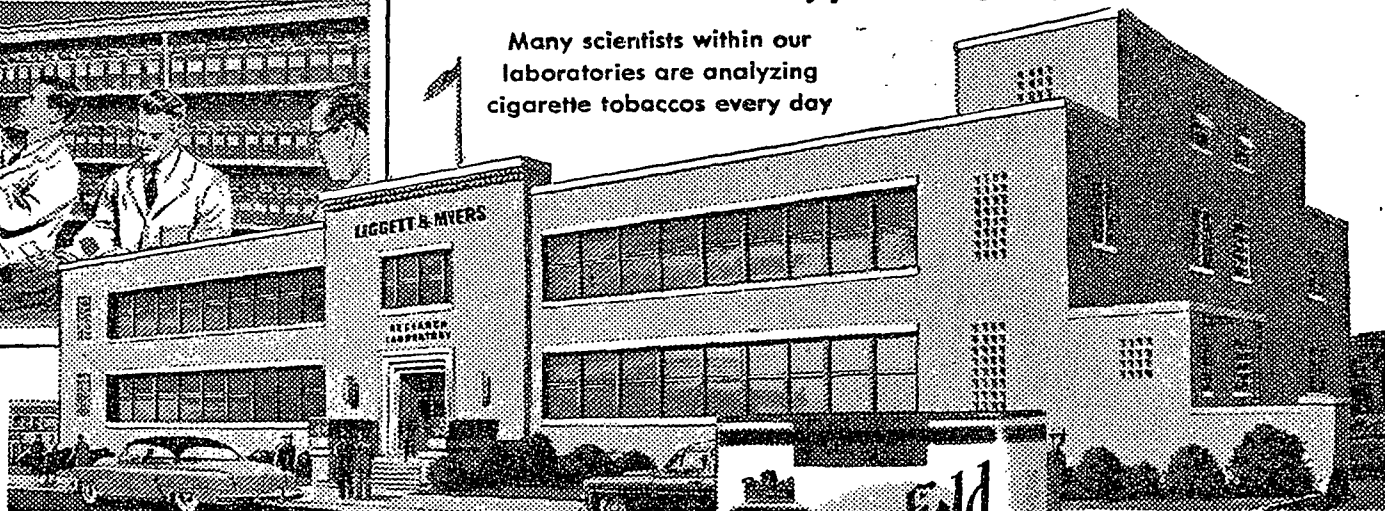
