(Continued from page one) unchaperoned from 5 to 8 p.m. Monday through Friday and from noon to 8 p.m. Saturday and Sunday. Other fraternities may attain these privileges by petitioning for and obtaining approval for this classification.

2. If chaperones are present, women guests may be entertained without registering events with the dean of men and dean of women, from 5 to 8 p.m. Monday through Friday and noon to 8 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

(Proper chaperonage is defined as two couples, three adults, or a part-time housemother. Chaperones must be chosen from the following: Alumni of the chapter of at least ten years' standing, member of the faculty or staff of the

University, fraternity advisers, and parents of chapter members.)

3. Women guests may remain until 1 a.m. on Friday and Saturday evenings if the intention to have such guests under proper chaperonage is registered with the dean of men and dean of women.

4. If full-time resident housemothers are employed and present, women guests may be entertained from noon to 8 p.m. Monday through Thursday, noon to dormitory closing hours Friday and Saturday, and noon to 8 p.m. Sunday.

Housemother Approval

Approval of both part-time and full-time housemothers must be granted by the fraternity adviser and the dean of men before they are employed by the fraternity. They must be employed on at least a semester basis, and must be reapproved at the beginning of each academic year.

Policies governing the use of alcoholic beverages formulated by the committee include provisions prohibiting the possession or use of such beverages on University property and "the maintenance of bars, dispensing equipment, or any other similar facility for storing or serving alcoholic beverages in a student living or social unit."

Officers Responsible

The proposal would make undergraduate officers of student organizations primarily responsible for the good conduct of members and guests at all functions, both on and off campus.

Individuals or organizations whose conduct is found to be "prejudicial to the good name of the University" will be subject to

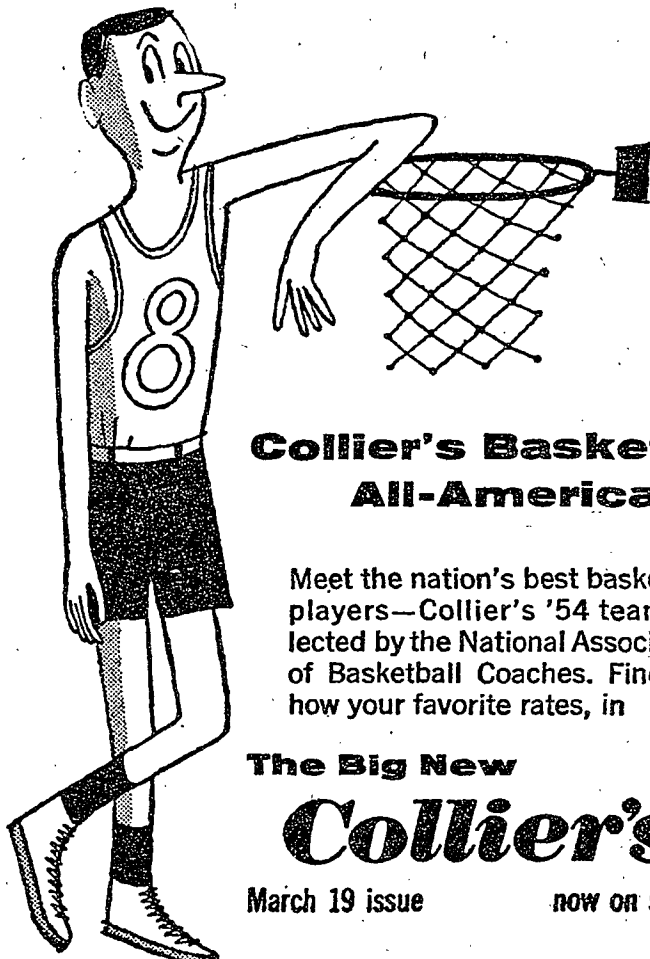
