

# Gymnasts, Boxers in Tournaments

## Thirteen Lions Will Vie For Individual Laurels

Among the 63 outstanding Eastern Intercollegiate gymnasts who will compete in Temple University's South Hall today and tomorrow for individual honors, will be 13 members of Penn State's highly-touted gym aggregation.

Today's individual competition will commence with action in the Olympic all-around division, which consists of free exercise, still rings, and the long horse.

To Defend Titles

Of the five teams entered in the meet, Army and Navy will not compete in the Olympic all-arounds. Penn State will enter three performers in the event, while Syracuse and Temple will each send two representatives into the action.

The entire field of contestants will vie in tomorrow's action which will get under way at 2 p.m. Competition will be seen in the six regular EIGA events, tumbling, rope climb, side horse, horizontal bar, parallel bars, and the flying rings. In order to be eligible for the Eastern all-around title, the gymnasts must compete in the latter four events.

### Lions 'Ones to Stop'

The Nittany Lions competing in the meet will undoubtedly be looked on as the 'ones to stop' for as a team they are sporting a 15 meet intercollegiate winning streak, six of which came during their undefeated past campaign.

The undefeated season enabled them to capture the EIGA crown for the second consecutive year. Defending all-around champion Jan Cronstedt, Tony Procopio, and Karl Schwenzfeier will lead the Nittanians in their quest to attain individual laurels.

Right on their heels will be Co-Captains Frank and Al Wick, Bob Lawrence, Skeets Haag, Dick Spiese, John Baffa, Bill Paxton, Paul Heim, Leroy Fritch, and Hugh Cline.

Cronstedt, a Finnish native, last year won Eastern and National titles in the all-around competition and also on the parallel bars. He has spearheaded the Lions in their past two campaigns with his brilliant routines on the parallels, H-bar, and on the mats. In addition to defending his title on the twin bars, he will perform in the Olympic all-arounds, and on the H-bar in the EIGA individual events.

Along with Cronstedt, Schwenzfeier and Procopio will enter in the Olympic competition. The duo will also vie for honors in the EIGA all-arounds, and on the rings in tomorrow's individual action.

### Lawrence Defends Title

Lawrence is the defending Eastern champ on the horse, and barring a mishap in his routine, is expected to retain the title. Frank Wick will also show his wares on the horse, along with Heim.

Al Wick is in contention for high honors on the parallels, while Haag is expected to find competi-

tion in the form of Temple's Gene Scholl. Scholl is the only opponent Haag faced during regular season action who forced him to settle for second honors. Army's John Funkhouser and John Ballyentyne also loom as top contenders for honors on the 20-foot climb.

### Spiese on H-Bar

Spiese is a potential top candidate for high honors on the H-bar. Used sparingly during the season, he put on a good showing in the West Virginia contest to boost him on the list of H-bar candidates.

Baffa will compete in two events—the rope and rings, while Paxton will perform on the mats. Fritch will enter the rope climb, and Cline will seek to show his wares on the H-bar to round out the Nittany representatives.

Temple, who the Lions defeated two weeks ago to retain their Eastern team title, will be represented by 11 members. Navy will have 15 gymnasts in the action, and Army and Syracuse will send 18 and six respectively.

## Boxers Awarded 4 Byes; 3 Enter 1st Round Tonight

Four of Penn State's seven entries in the Intercollegiate Boxing Association tourney in the East to be held at Memorial gymnasium tonight have drawn byes into the semi-final round.

Bob McMath, 137-pounds, Jack Stokes, 147-pounder, Adam Kois, 178-pound Eastern champ, and Joe Goleman, heavyweight, will not see any first-round action tonight. Kois, however, will meet Elmer Wilson, Army, in the Lions' only semi-final bout tonight.

Kois will be the favorite to enter the finals Saturday night. Penn State's defending champ defeated the Cadet's Wilson just last week at Army. The bout was stopped at 0:36 of the third round.

Three Lions—Harry (Pappy) Papacharalambous, 125-pounds, Ron Smith, 139-pounds, and Frank Breidor, 165-pounds—will enter the first-round eliminations tonight.

### DeMay, Martin Out

Smith, a sophomore who fought and lost his only bout of the season at Army last week, replaced Don Martin, the Lions' regular 139-pounder, who is scholastically ineligible. No entry for Penn State was made in the 156-pound class. Don DeMay, the Lions' scrappy 156-pound sophomore, did not accompany the team. He suffered a broken nose at Army last week.

Grice Whitely and Smith will meet tonight in the first-round eliminations. Virginia's Whitely lost to Martin, 29-27, this season.

Pappy will face Frank Guelli, Syracuse, tonight. Guelli, a classy ringman, defeated the Lions' Dick Evanko, 30-25.

### Breidor Meets Champ

Penn State's biggest barrier to jump in the first round will be in the 165-pound bout. Breidor will face Vince Rigolosi, Syracuse co-captain and Eastern champ last year. Rigolosi dumped Breidor, 30-26, earlier this season. But Breidor has improved greatly, however, since his first collegiate bout against Rigolosi.

In the 132-pound semi-final bout Saturday sophomore Bob McMath will meet the winner of the Mike Stevenson (A)—Vince Palumbo (M) bout. McMath's appearance in the Easterns will be his third collegiate bout. But the clever lightweight may be a "dark horse" for the Lions.

### Stokes Meets Nelson

Jack Stokes, the third Lion to receive a bye into the semi-finals Saturday afternoon will face Art Nelson, 147-pounder from Syracuse. Nelson may give the Lions' polished sophomore some trouble. Nelson won his first-round entry last year in the same tourney, but failed to make the weight in his second bout.

Joe Coleman, a junior, will meet the winner of the Bill Creech (V)—Dick Croyne (M) preliminary bout. Creech lost to Goleman at Virginia two weeks ago, 30-27. A victory in the preliminaries Friday night awards one point to

the team score, while a victory in the semi-finals is worth three points. The winner of the individual crown in the finals wins five points; an individual champ can therefore win a total of nine points towards his team's final score.
