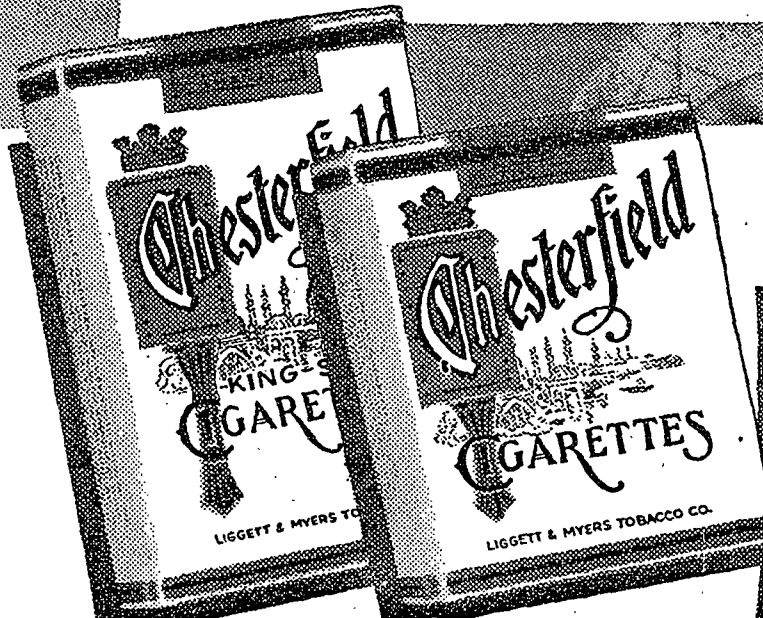
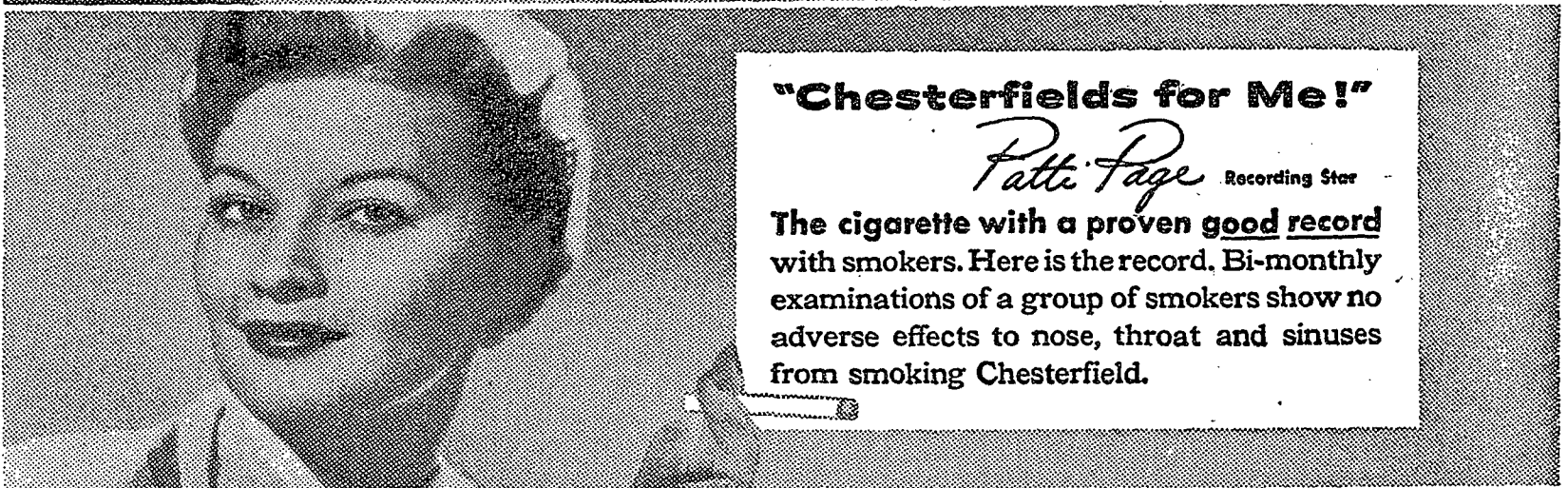
'On Approval' To Begin Tour
