

# Boxers' Final Test Is Saturday at LSU

Penn State's boxing team will embark on the final leg of a four-match road trip this weekend to close out its 1954 intercollegiate dual meet boxing campaign. The Lions will be seeking their second win this weekend when they face Louisiana State University at Baton Rouge, La. The two teams have never met before.

But road trips have not been the mark of success for Coach Sulkowski and his ring

team thus far. While facing Wisconsin, Virginia, and Army in three consecutive road trips followed up by the Eastern Intercollegiate Boxing Tourney, the Lions netted their only win of the season at Virginia, 5½-2½.

LSU also dumped Virginia, and by the same score. In winning its season opener before 4000 home fans, LSU took an added advantage with Virginia forfeits at 147-pounds and 178-pounds.

But since their season-opening victory, Coach Jim Owen and his squad have picked up momentum. While keeping their slate clean, the Louisianians also boast their most recent victory over Wisconsin. LSU dumped the Badgers just last week, 5-3. Penn State dropped its third match in four outings earlier this season to the Badgers at Wisconsin, 6-2.

The Tigers have a powerful lineup, and are very strong in the same weights that Penn State has been accumulating most of its individual dual meet points.

At Virginia, LSU walked off with the first three bouts by the decision route and then the 147-pound class by forfeit.

125-pounder Bob Freeman decided Virginia's Bill Banerdt who tied with Penn State's Harry Papacharlambois. At the 132-pound slot LSU's John Stiglets decided Bob Rush.

Penn State's regular 132-pound-

er Bob McMath also decided Rush, but by a slim margin, 29-28. At 139 pounds LSU's third victory against Virginia was copied by Bob Jackson; Penn State's Don Martin also defeated Virginia's 139-pounder, Grice Whiteley. But Martin is ineligible for intercollegiate boxing competition.

After Louisiana State took the 147-pound victory by forfeit, Pete Potter finally stopped the Tiger's winning monopoly and defeated Gary Bowden for Virginia's first point.

# Lion Cagers Ranked 9th; Kentucky Tops AP Poll

NEW YORK, March 23 (AP)—The University of Kentucky, scars of recent scandals healed, came back from serving a year's penance to reclaim its position today as the nation's No. 1 college basketball team.

Adolph Rupp's Wildcats passed up tournament competition when three of their top stars were ruled ineligible.

Kentucky received a total of 1,110 points to shade LaSalle, winner of the National Collegiate tournament last Saturday at Kansas City, and Holy Cross, surprise victor in the earlier National Invitation at Madison Square Garden.

Indiana, poll winner and national collegiate champion last year, finished in fourth place, followed, in order, by Duquesne, No-

tre Dame, Bradley, Western Kentucky, Penn State and Oklahoma A.&M.

While the poll is based on full season plus tournament play, the impact of the tournament competition is seen in the final results. LaSalle and Holy Cross never threatened for top place until their tournament success. Bradley, runnerup in the NCAA, gained seventh despite a mediocre 19-13 overall record and Penn State, third in the NCAA tournament, won ninth with an 18-6 mark.

Others following the first ten, in order, were:

Southern California, George Washington, Iowa, L.S.U., Duke, Niagara, Seattle, Kansas, Illinois, Maryland, North Carolina State, Dayton, Wichita, Navy and Oregon.

## Baseball Citrus Dope

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., March 23 (AP)—Ex-Yankee star Vic Raschi hurled six scoreless innings, his best performance of the spring exhibition series, to start the St. Louis Cardinals toward a 6-5 victory over the Milwaukee Braves today.

The righthanded Raschi allowed five hits—all singles—and didn't walk a batter. He also struck out six.

Righthander Bob Buhl of Milwaukee, who had given up just one run in 15 previous innings, was touched for three runs in the first frame of today's game on two walks and four singles.

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla., March 23 (AP)—Carl Erskine became the first Brooklyn pitcher to go the route as the Dodgers trounced the A's 10-2 today.

Erskine allowed five hits and walked only two batters. Three of the Philadelphia hits were bunched in the fourth inning when the A's tallied their two runs. Two Brooklyn errors made one run unearned.

ORLANDO, Fla., March 23 (AP)—Washington slammed eight hits off Robin Roberts in two innings today and went on to defeat the Philadelphia Phillies 3-2.

The Phils grabbed a 2-0 lead against Bob Porterfield. Richie Ashburn's double and Earl Torgerson's single accounting for a run in the first inning and a walk, a pair of sacrifices and Ashburn's single producing another in the third.

SARASOTA, Fla., March 23 (AP)—Righthander Willard Nixon pitched and batted the Boston Red Sox to their fifth straight victory today, with the Cincinnati Reds the 2-0 victims.

Nixon gave up only two hits in his six innings and drove a double to left field to chalk up the first run of the game. Rookie Tom Brewer, taking over for the last three innings, ran his string of scoreless innings to 17 in Grapefruit League competition.

LAKELAND, Fla., March 23 (AP)—The Detroit Tigers went on a hitting spree today, but still lost their 10th game in 15 starts—this one to the Chicago White Sox 9-7.

The White Sox pounded Ned Garver for seven runs in the first six innings. Garver absorbed the loss.

FORT PIERCE, Fla., March 23 (AP)—First baseman Paul Smith of the Pittsburgh Pirates nursed a painful neck today after being hit by a ball in practice.

Pitcher Bob Hall threw hard in an attempt to nail Smith who was on first during a base-running drill and the ball hit Smith, virtually knocking him unconscious.

PHOENIX, Ariz., March 23 (AP)—Righthander Larry Jansen and southpaw Johnny Antonelli combined to pitch the New York Giants to a 5-0 victory over the Chicago Cubs today in a game called by rain after 5½ innings.

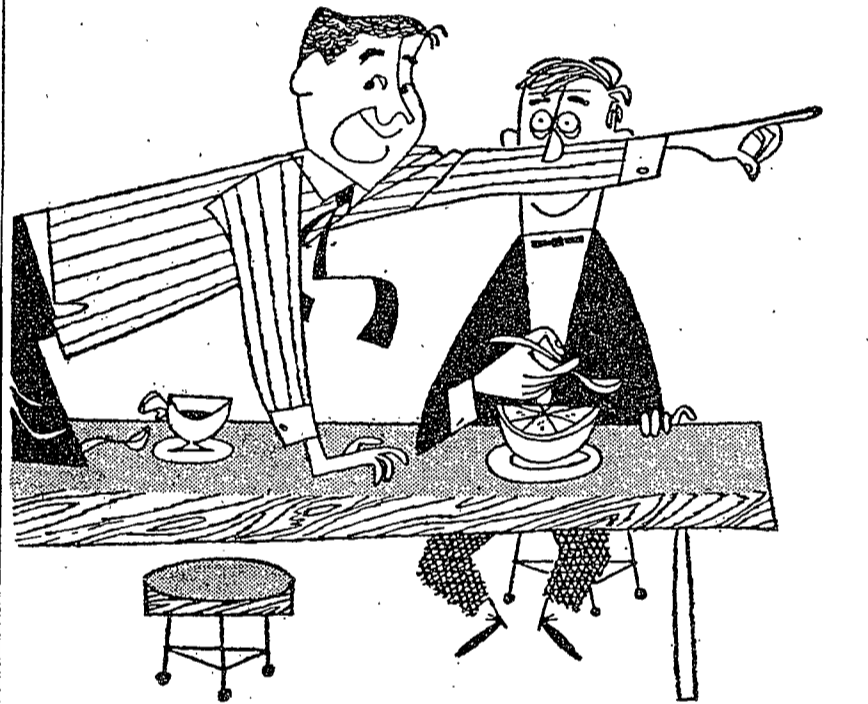

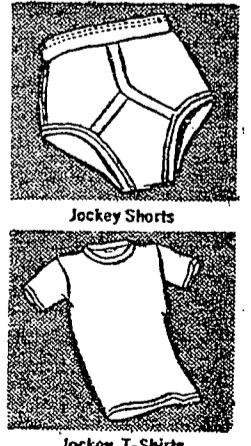
