

Arnelle Takes Office Monday

All-University president-elect Jesse Arnelle will be inaugurated as Penn State's highest student government official at 6:30 p.m. Monday at the annual All-University Cabinet banquet.

The banquet will be held for new and old members of cabinet at the Allencrest Tea Room.

William Shiflett, chairman of Tribunal, will perform the inauguration ceremony.

Retiring All-University president Richard Lemyre will speak.

Proxy to Attend

Included in the 65 persons to attend the banquet will be President Milton S. Eisenhower; George L. Donovan, director of associated student activities; Wilmer E. Kenworthy, director of student affairs; Dean of Men Frank J. Simes; and Dean of Women Pearl O. Weston.

New members of cabinet will be installed by Arnelle at the next cabinet meeting, David Arnold, retiring All-University secretary-treasurer, said yesterday. Speaking from the University Hospital yesterday, where he is being treated for a cold, Arnelle said he had not yet set a date for a cabinet meeting.

Six Posts Filled

All-University spring elections Wednesday and Thursday filled six of the 25 available cabinet seats. Winners were John Speer, All-University vice president; Robert Homan, All-University secretary-treasurer; Donald Balthaser, senior class president; John Thalimer, junior class president; and Ronald Weidenhammer, Athletic Association president.

This year's total vote in the All-University elections was higher than it was any other year. Under the newly-enacted decentralized voting system 4420 of the 9442 students eligible to vote cast ballots, setting the vote percentage at 46.8.

In a statement to the Daily Collegian yesterday Edwin Kohn, All-University elections committee chairman, said he didn't consider the gainage in this year's total vote over last year's sufficient to warrant use next year of four voting polls without use of voting machines.

Favors Two Polls

Kohn said he favored use of a portion of the decentralized voting system next year and would recommend polls only in the West Dorms and the new Student Union building with voting machines.

In general comment on the elections campaigning this year, Kohn said that both parties contacted a majority of voters and distributed sufficient publicity in the town.

No campaign violations were reported to the committee, Kohn said.

Extension Changes Announced

A rearrangement of divisions and departments, and new assignments for staff members within General Extension have been announced by President Milton S. Eisenhower. The changes will become effective May 1.

Stanley H. Campbell, director of Community Colleges, will become assistant to the director of General Extension.

Six divisions have been created, the heads of which will form an operating committee. The committee will also include Edward L. Keller, director of General Extension, and Campbell.

The divisions are graduate and undergraduate instruction under T. Stewart Goas; short courses and terminal instruction under Thomas J. Rung; informal instruction under Hugh G. Pyle; center administration, headed by Merle E. Campbell, administrative head of the Penn State center at Hazleton; business and records, Norwood A. Hedden in charge.

T. Reed Ferguson, administrative head of the Penn State Behrend Center in Erie, has been named head of the State College Extension Center. He will have the responsibility for the promotion and physical arrangements for the institutes, conferences, and short courses conducted in State College through General Extension.

Irvin H. Kochel, administrative head of the Penn State Center in Harrisburg, will succeed Ferguson at Behrend Center.

7 Spring Carnival Applications OK'd

Seven of 41 Spring Week carnival applications were approved by a student screening committee Wednesday night, according to Richard Grossman, carnival co-chairman. The student screening committee is composed of three All-University officers, and the presidents of the Association of Independent Men, Interfraternity Council, Women's Student Government Association, Panhellenic Council, and Leonides.

Thirty-four applications were rejected by the committee because details of carnival booths and booth activity were not sufficient to enable the committee to judge the applications, George Richards, Spring Week chairman, said.

Organizations whose applications were approved by the committee are Delta Chi, Alpha Gamma Delta; Alpha Sigma Phi, Delta Tau Delta; the College Co-Operative Society; Kappa Delta Rho; Phi-Sigma Kappa, Leonides; West Dormitory Council; Phi Sigma Sigma.

Deadline Monday

The deadline for revised applications to be handed in by organizations whose previous applications were rejected is 5 p.m. Monday at the Student Union desk in Old Main.

Revisions must be written on organization stationery so the group submitting the application may be identified, Grossman said. If two organizations are working together in the carnival, May 12 and 13, they need hand in only one joint revision, he said.

Complete Detail Asked

Revisions should contain complete detail of booths and booth activity, including a description of the costumes and proposed skit, and reasons for unique properties, Grossman said.

The screening committee will give final approval on revised applications Tuesday night. Groups whose applications are rejected at that time will be notified, and will be allowed to hand in another revision after Easter vacation, Grossman said.

ICG to Participate In State Convention

The Penn State chapter of Intercollegiate Conference on Government will attend the state Intercollegiate Conference on Government this weekend in Harrisburg.

The convention will be in the form of a mock United States Congress complete with a "Speaker of the House" as chairman of the convention.

The Little International livestock judging contest, open to experienced and non-experienced judges, will begin at 1 p.m. today in the Stock Pavilion.

The contest will be made up of two divisions: one for students who have had little or no experience at judging animals and a professional division for students who have had Animal Husbandry 3 or 4.

In the amateur division contestants will judge two classes of horses, cattle, swine and sheep. Ribbons and cash prizes will be awarded to ranking contestants. A 25 cent donation will be collected from students when they register.
