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gining and Architecture, the structure will make possible four general types of research and work in reactor engineering. It will provide facilities for investigation of neutron distribution, reactor kinetics, and other related characteristics of the atom.

The reactor is similar to the model used in the Oak Ridge national laboratories with some modifications by the University. While the University is handling the cost of the reactor and building, the uranium needed is being given for the project on loan from the Atomic Energy Commission.

William M. Breazeale, professor of nuclear engineering, was the original local director of the construction and faculty members working on revising the plans were Maurice R. Cjesdahl, professor of mechanical engineering, and Kenneth B. Lawrence, associate professor of mechanical engineering.
