(Continued from page one) ginering and Architecture, the structure will make possible four general types of research and work in reactor engineering. It will provide facilities for investigation of neutron distribution, reactor kinetics, and other related characteristics of the atom.

The reactor is similar to the model used in the Oak Ridge national laboratories with some mod-ifications by the University. While the University is handling the cost of the reactor and building, the uranium needed is being given for the project on loan from the Atomic Energy Commission.
