

# Harris Wins Contest For Cattle Judging

John Harris, sixth semester agriculture education major, was the winner of the advanced division of the 29th annual dairy cattle judging contest Saturday and Alice Brambley, fourth semester pre-veterinary major, took top honors in the amateur division.

Harris, last year's amateur division winner, amassed an overall

score of 640 points out of a possible 750. He placed second in the judging of the Holstein breed, third in Guernsey, and fourth in Ayrshire judging in gaining his point total.

As winner of the advanced division Harris will have his name inscribed on the Paul Gulden trophy and will receive a cash prize.

Second place in the advanced division went to William Hoover, fourth semester dairy husbandry major, with a total of 607 points. Harry Douth, sixth semester dairy husbandry major, took third place with 603 points. Both will receive cash prizes.

### Scores 456 Points

In winning the amateur division of the contest Miss Brambley scored 456 points out of a possible 500. She will have her name inscribed on the trophy donated by Alpha Zeta, Alpha Gamma Rho, and Delta Theta Sigma.

Harold Melchior, sixth semester pre-veterinary major, placed second in the amateur division. Francis Liscko was third.

The winners of the individual breed judgments in the advanced division were Harry Douth, sixth semester dairy husbandry major, Holstein; Jacob Guffey, sixth semester dairy husbandry major, Guernsey; Steve Spencer, eighth semester dairy husbandry major, Brown Swiss and Jersey; and John Yeager, fourth semester agriculture major, Ayrshire.

### Amateur Division

Individual breed judging winners in the amateur division were Alice Brambley, Holstein; Byron Lee, second semester dairy husbandry major, Guernsey; John Klepper, second semester agriculture education major, Brown Swiss; Allan Palmer, eighth semester agriculture economics major, Ayrshire; and Clarence Bryan, fourth semester animal husbandry major, Jersey.
