

Colgate Snaps Golfer's Streak

Colgate, the last team to beat the Lions before they staged a 12-match victory streak, snapped that same streak yesterday edging the Lions, 4-3. But the Maroon had their hands full with the Penn State's golfing power of four lettermen.

Captain Rod Eaken and junior Warren Gittlen posted victories along with sophomore standout Jim Boyanowski, but the remainder of the Nittany roster fell to its Colgate opponents.

A lead-off victory by Eaken was a hint of what the Lions had in store for them from the Maroon links squad. He finally defeated Larry Larsen one up on the 22nd hole. Gittlen then added another point to the Lions score with a 4-3 victory over Dutch Schermerborn.

Webb, Stroup Lose

Then the Lions' two veteran power men—Joe Webb and Gordon Stroup—lost their matches. Webb lost a heart-breaker to Jim Davidson who birdied the 19th hole to take the match one up. Stroup dropped his first match of the season to Jim Smith by a slim 2-1 margin.

Boyanowski, playing his third collegiate match, pulled the Lions out of the 2-2 tie with a two-up victory over Jack Riley.

But the Lions' attack fell off as newcomers Gerry Gerhart and Jim Ginsberg dropped their matches. Gerhart was defeated four and three by Al Shuttlesworth, while his classmate Ginsberg was edged one up.

Stroup, although he lost, was the Lions' medalist over the difficult Colgate course with a 71. The Maroon's Smith shot the best card of the afternoon with a 69 on the par 68 course. Record for the Colgate course is 65.

Toughest Match—Rutherford

After the match, Coach Bob Rutherford said, "This was our toughest match since the last time we played Colgate at home—when it defeated us."

With their 12-match win streak broken and a current season card of 3-1 with victories over Navy, Gettysburg, and Bucknell, the Lions left for Ithaca, N.Y. last night to meet Cornell's Big Red links squad this afternoon.

After the two-match road trip this weekend, the Lions will visit the Temple University course in Philadelphia Tuesday. Lehigh will meet the Lions on the local course Saturday. Penn State closes its 1954 golf campaign at Pittsburgh May 26.

Maroon Raiders Stop Foggmen, 6-3

A clean sweep of the doubles matches enabled Colgate to defeat coach Sherman Fogg's Nittany netmen yesterday at Colgate, 6-3. The loss snapped the Lions' winning skein at five games and at the same time increased Colgate's record to ten wins and a single loss. The Lions move over to Syracuse today to meet the Orangemen.

Great comebacks by seniors Dick Robinson and Bruz Ray in the singles competition kept the Raiders from turning the match into a rout. Robinson chalked up his sixth victory of the season by edging

Dave Lewis after a poor initial set, 3-6, 6-1, 6-3. Ray continued his fine showing by turning back Marv Pomerantz, 4-6, 6-4, 6-3.

Sophomore Ed Seiling, playing in the number six position, swept Bo Meyer in straight sets, 6-3, 6-2. Lew Landon absorbed his third setback of the season, bowing to Colgate's Pete Herman, 0-6, 4-6. Landon has won five matches.

Kent Hipkins of the Raiders ended the winning ways of Lion Bill Ziegler but not without a tight squeeze, 4-6, 6-4, 6-4. In the number five match of the day, the winners' Ed Soderlund whipped Penn State's Dean Mullen, 7-5, 6-2. The loss was Mullen's first since the Navy encounter.

The Lions were unable to win a set as Colgate dominated the doubles play. Lewis and Herman put the Maroon Raiders in front to stay with an easy victory over Robinson and Landon, 6-3, 6-4. Ziegler and Ray did their best to even things up as Hipkins and Pomerantz were extended, 5-7, 8-10, before winning.

In the final doubles match, Soderlund and Meyer tripped Seiling and Mullen, 6-0, 6-4.

Penn State has now lost three matches in a row to the Maroon Raiders. The Lions lost at home last year 6-3 after dropping an earlier 9-0 match at Colgate. The Lions at least have the satisfaction of knowing that they lost to one of the most powerful squads in the East.

The Lions will travel to Bucknell Wednesday for their final road test and will close their season the following Wednesday when they meet Lehigh on the local courts.

DETROIT, May 14 (AP)—The awakening New York Yankees, gaining momentum in their first western trip of the season, handed Detroit's Steve Gromek his first setback after five straight victories, 6-4.

The World Champions swept to their ninth victory in 11 games by raking Gromek for a dozen hits—five of them for extra bases—in six innings.

Bob Grim replaced starter Harry Byrd in the fifth inning but needed assistance in the ninth when the Tigers scored their fourth run. Johnny Sain was called in from the bullpen and after filling the bases with a walk, he choked off the Tiger threat by retiring Harvey Kuenn on a fly to center.

The Yankees' two runs in the fifth broke a 3-3 tie. Irv Noren opened the fifth with a single and Yogi Berra and Gene Woodling followed with doubles.

Woodling opened the second inning with a 400-foot triple to center, scoring when Ed Robinson bounced a single off the glove of first baseman Walt Dropo. Gil McDougald sent Robinson to third with a double off the leftfield screen.

Robinson scored on Andy Carey's sacrifice fly to right and McDougald counted when Byrd singled to left.
