

4th Seminar Of Newsmen Begins Today

The privileges and responsibilities of newspapers in reporting law enforcement events will be discussed at the fourth annual seminar for newspapermen at the University today and tomorrow.

R. Wallace Brewster, professor and head of the Department of Political Science, will be chairman of the seminar which is sponsored by the Pennsylvania Society of Newspaper Editors and the University.

Among the speakers at the seminar will be Wayland H. Elsbree, editor of the Philadelphia Legal Intelligencer, who will talk on the question: which records are public and which are privileged? William M. Smith Jr., professor of family relationships, will speak on sex crime stories; William F. Achatz, photography editor of the Philadelphia associated press, will speak on news photographers and their problems in courts.

Dinner speakers will be Jefferson B. Fordham, dean of the University of Pennsylvania Law School; and Mason W. Gross, Rutgers University provost.

tion, 35 per cent, \$3081.43; World University Service, 20 per cent, \$1357.60; Penn State Student Scholarship Fund, 10 per cent, \$1161.09; Women's Student Government Association Christmas Fund, 4 per cent, \$399.29; State College Welfare Fund, 1 per cent, \$71.59; Damon Runyan Cancer Fund, \$680.65 and American Cancer Society, \$594.76, 5 per cent between them; Salvation Army, five per cent, \$481.49; Cerebral Palsy Drive, five per cent, \$633.61; American Red Cross, five per cent, \$374.02; and American Heart Association, five per cent, \$593.44.

Operating expenses for the program amounted to \$965.55. A balance of \$235.56 will be left for operating expenses until the new drive gets underway next year.

Most of the same charity groups will be continued next year, Smith said. Besides the UCA other changes in the allocations will be the deletion of one of the cancer groups and the addition of the National Scholarship for Negro Study. Contributions will be collected in cash again next year, Smith said.
