

Navy ROTC Will Present Seven Awards

Seven students will be presented awards at a review of the Navy Reserve Officers Training Corps units at 3 p.m. today in front of Old Main.

Major Harry L. Detwiler of State College will present the Reserve Officers Association medal while Rear Admiral J. G. Crawford will present the Navy League Plaque.

University provost Adrian O. Morse will present the U.S. Naval Institute awards and George L. Haller, dean of the College of Chemistry and Physics, will present the Society of American Military Engineers gold medal.

The Marine Corps Association award will be presented by Captain Rowland H. Groff, professor of naval science. The Fourth Naval District award will be presented for the Commandant of the Fourth Naval District, while the Armed Forces Communications Association gold medal will be presented by Eric A. Walker, dean of the College of Engineering.

The University is tentatively planning to add 300 to 500 campus parking areas this summer, Weiner estimated.

More Space Needed

Campus parking lots can now hold a total of 3034 cars, Weiner said. The total number of cars, however, of students, graduates, and faculty and staff members who have permits totals 4123. "Our parking lots are now 136 per cent full," Weiner said, "but we are still short more than 1000 parking spaces."

Weiner will also propose a plan to change the composition of students of the traffic court committee itself. It includes a plan for nine students, including two sophomores, four juniors, two seniors and one graduate student. One of the seniors would be chairman, and the other vice chairman.

The number of fraternity and independent men on the committee would be equal, Weiner said. We also would like to change the plan of paying fines, Weiner said. The proposal will include a plan for the payment of fines incurred to the bursar instead of to court or the dean of men.

Registration of Cars

A new registration plan for students who have cars at the University is also included in Weiner's proposals.

"If a student will have a car at the University more than three weeks," Weiner explained, "he

must register it. A \$2 fine will be enforced for violators who have not registered their cars.

Weiner will also propose the enforcement of a fine on violators who do not report within 36 hours after receiving a violation. The present system allows the violator 24 hours to report to the Campus Patrol office.

New Fining Plan

The final point of Weiner's traffic proposals to cabinet will be a system to change the present fining procedures. This will include a \$1 fine for a first violation, a \$3 fine for the second, and a \$5 fine for the third which will also place the student on probation. The fourth violation will cost the violator \$10, and a suspension of his driving privileges on campus for 60 days.

"If a fifth violation is received," Weiner said, "the plan would call for the car being sent home for 16 weeks."
