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

During the week, new students will be tested and familiarized with facilities and personalities at the University. Freshmen will also receive instruction from members of men's and women's hat societies in special counseling sessions to-

morrow through Wednesday.

Residence halls have been filled Residence halls have been filled except some units in the Pollock Circle area where about 100 vacancies exist, Otto E. Mueller, director of housing, has reported. Women's residence halls have been filled to accommodate the 895 new coeds. A total of approximately 3000 men and 2400 women will reside in University residence halls, Mueller said.
