tween that dormitory and Woman's Building.

If the crystals in the transformers of these two buildings are not properly tuned to temperature and other factors, a resident in Woman's Building, for instance, may get AM signals from both her hall and McAllister on the 640 frequency. If this happens, she would hear nothing but a sort of whistle over her radio.

The transponder was in operation about a half hour. Movement of the set after the first test disrupted the carefully adjusted parts of the unit and a test on the following Monday failed.

Another problem which may hold up the installation of more transponders is the fact that several of the commercially-built FM sets used with the transponders are not working correctly and will have to be repaired.

posed with the University on the proposed wage classification plan.

Meanwhile, R. A. Callahan, international representative for Local 67, said that Local 67 is still the organization representing the University employees.

Fink said last night that Local 67 "would continue to work for the good of employees at the University." The union has not met since the break was voted, he said, so that plans are indefinite at this time.

Fink said he did not yet know whether his group would cooperate with the new organization. He said the question would be left up to the members when they met.

Fink said he felt that many workers would return to the local in the future. He said letters would be sent to each University employee "today or tomorrow" pointing out the benefits they received under Local 67.

As an example, he cited the 40-hour week and other benefits which he said were achieved while he was president.
