

Nominations To Close For Frosh

Nominations for freshmen to all student councils will close at noon today. Elections will be held Tuesday and Wednesday.

Freshmen in the Home Economics college may nominate candidates by placing names in the nominations box in the lobby of the Home Economics building.

said fraternities should not work against the administration and he couldn't see much hope in the future if they continually do so. Fraternities should work with and cooperate with the administration, he said, but not as "stooges" and "yes men."

In his first area of rights and privileges, Turner said fraternities have the right to run their own affairs, free from the administration and alumni. He emphasized again it is only the fraternities' privilege to exist, and they have a responsibility to accept and cooperate with the rules and regulations of the administration.

In his second area, the right of fraternities to plan their own social programs, Turner said fraternities should not only follow the rules of the administration but also those of the community, state, and nation.

The fraternities third right is that of choosing their own members, Turner said. He advised they choose them wisely and with efficiency. He said the discrimination problem which has plagued several institutions will reach the University eventually through pressure groups.

The fraternities fourth and fifth areas of rights are those of handling their own finances and liquor affairs, he said. The right to use liquor is a privilege in the United States, he said, and it is the fraternities' responsibility to respect this privilege.

The final area pointed out by Turner, is the fraternities' right to do as they please. He said fraternities should obey the regulations of the national fraternity and act as leading citizens of the institution, for they will be criticized as such.

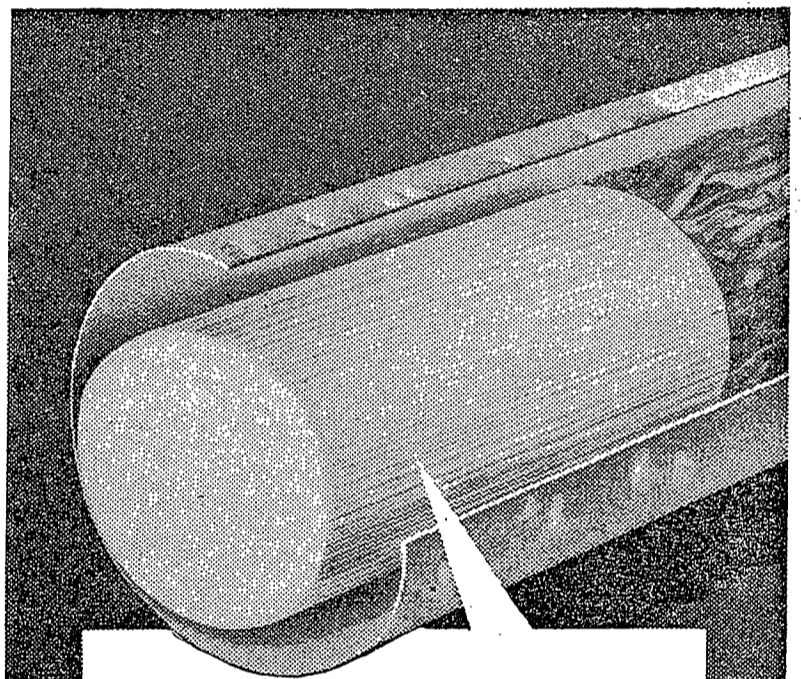

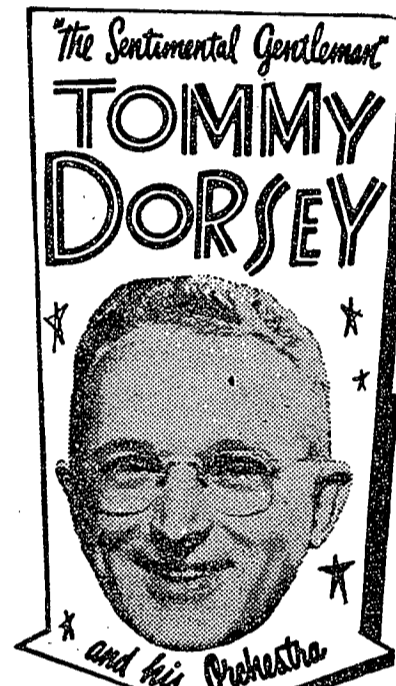

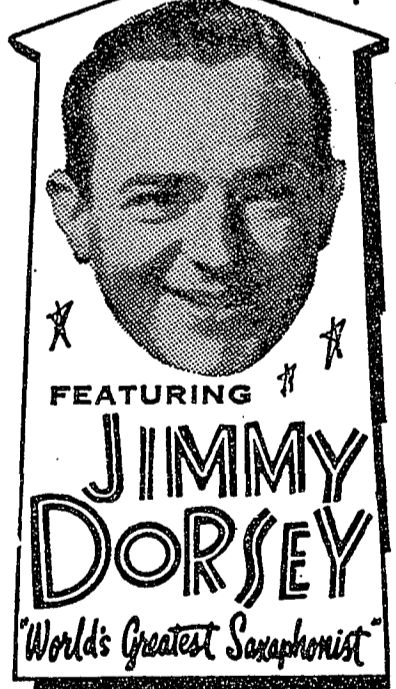
