iversity authorities despite repeated efforts to do so.

They further quoted Abrams as saying:

"It is not the policy of the department to establish independent post offices in private institutions, campuses of colleges, whether state or privately operated, nor for the benefit of any public or privately owned company or corporation when other mail facilities

are available. This policy has been in effect for a number of years."

The Friends of State College concluded that the establishment of a University post office would apparently reverse the long-standing policy of the Post Office Department as stated in the letter quoted above.

The letter authorizing the establishment of a campus post office disclosed last night by McLucas outlined the facilities needed by the University to establish a post office.

These include approximately 600 square feet of space with heat, light, and water to be supplied by the University. The postal department would provide the necessary furniture and equipment.

"A classified postal station of the character described would adequately serve both as to the change of the name of the postal address and for providing the usual services," the letter from the postmaster general's office read.

488 voters contacted, 239 favored keeping the name State College, 145 favored Mt. Nittany, 75 favored a change but did not like Mt. Nittany, and 29 were undecided.

The views of the University on the name change were expressed by President Milton S. Eisenhow-

er in a letter to Herbert R. Imbt of the State College Area Chamber of Commerce.

Name Not Established

In his letter, Eisenhower said that the name of the University is not becoming established throughout the state and nation as it should.

"Every press release issued by our institution carries the dateline 'State College' and this is naturally assumed by newspaper readers to be descriptive of the institution," the president wrote.

Eisenhower said that he has also noted this confusion in his travels.

Eisenhower also stated that he has noticed that people generally do not realize where the University is located although they do

not have difficulty locating other large universities.

In his letter Eisenhower did not actually favor or oppose the name change.

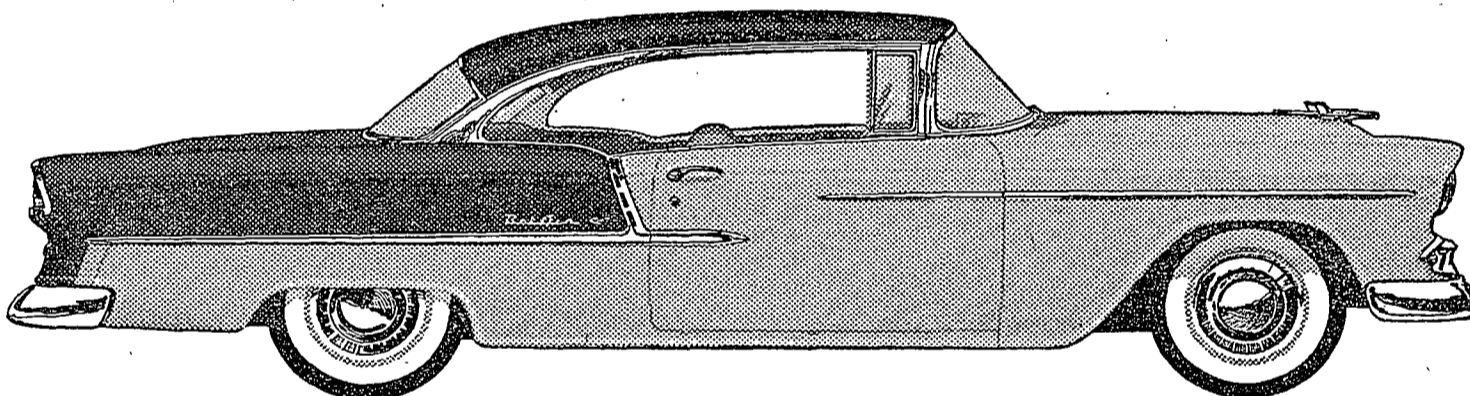
