the following year became the principal director. He was named principal secretary and personal representative of the Secretary-General with the United Nations Mediator on Palestine in 1948 and later that year was appointed acting mediator in Palestine.

Bunche will be introduced by President Milton S. Eisenhower.

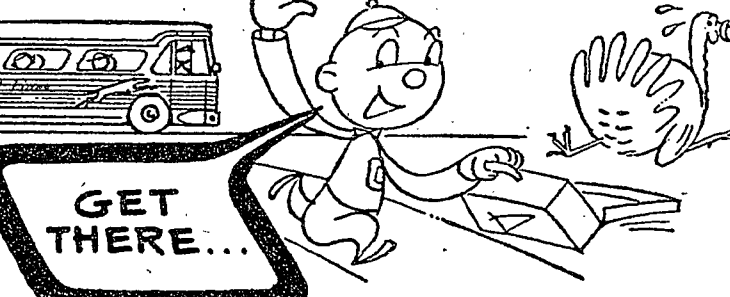
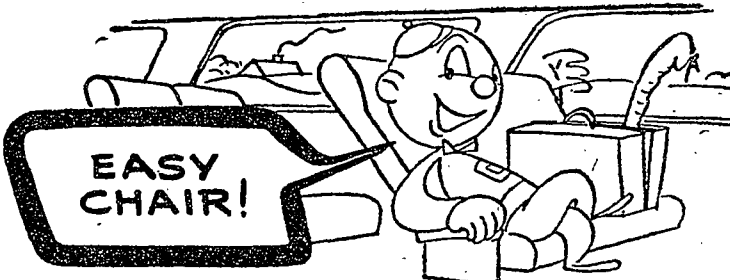

the order in which testimony will be presented. All parties were instructed to file briefs indicating the nature of the testimony to be presented with the panel at least five days in advance of the hearing. Arrangements were also made for the appearance of witnesses, who are to be given the necessary time off without any loss of pay. All witnesses will be sworn.

A record and transcript of the hearings will be furnished to the panel and all parties without cost. The formal hearings will be open to the press.

At the hearings, the position of the employee unions and the University will be discussed. According to Dixon, the panel was originally requested because of the University's "lack of consideration and a general attitude of not recognizing a union."

Panel members include Eric A. Walker, dean of the College of Engineering and Architecture, representing the University; Sidney A. Handler, Harrisburg attorney, chosen to represent the employees; and Saul Wallen, president of the National Academy of Arbitrators.
