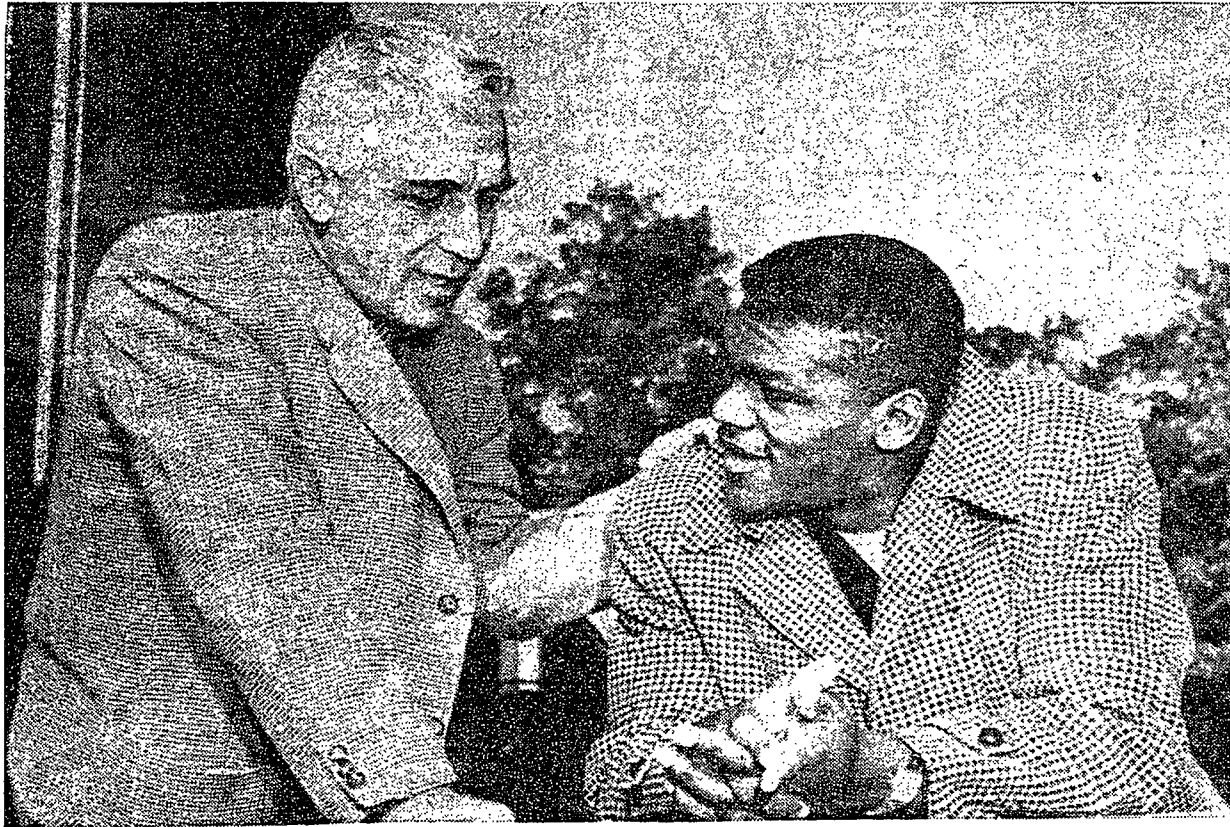


Talking It Over . . .

Gridders are Heavy Favorites Again

The Scarlet has won only two games this year but both victories came on its last two outings. After losing five in a row, it whipped Temple and Lehigh in succession.

The biggest obstacle today, of course, will be in stopping Lenny Moore, the dynamic Lion halfback who is in hot pursuit of the national rushing title and another Penn State offensive record.

The Reading Rocket is just 74 yards behind Arizona's Art Luppino in the race for the most rushing yards gained and needs 188 to top E. E. (Shorty) Miller's total offensive mark set at Penn State in 1912.

Needs 1031 Yards

Moore now has 843 yards from scrimmage and needs 1031 to match the standard. His 126 yards last week smashed Miller's 42-year old rushing mark.

Once again the Lions will be in poor physical shape and coach Rip Engle will substitute in two line positions. Co-captain Jim Garrity is nursing an injured ankle and tackle Otto Kneidinger will have to wait one more week before his injured leg will be ready for full time use. Reserve fullback Chuck Blockson is out for the third straight week with a bad leg and tackle Clint Law is out of action for the remainder of the year with a fractured arm.

Rohland To Start

Bob Rohland will move into the right end slot replacing Garrity and Gene Danser will hold down the right tackle position.

In the backfield along with Moore, Engle will have Ron Younker, the pint-sized stop-and-go speedster who has carried a tremendous load of the Penn State offense, at halfback, Bill Straub at fullback, and Don Bailey at quarterback.

Jesse Arnette will team with Rohland at left end, and Rosey Grier will be at the left tackle spot. Sophomore Dick De Luca is slated for left guard and Keith Horn will be at the other guard position. Frank Reich gets the call at center.

Warm weather is expected, but a crowd of only 16,000 is anticipated for the Lions' final home match.

Except for the players still engaged in football and two others—co-captain Ronnie Weidenhammer and Dave Edwards—engaged in practice teaching, Penn State's basketball team has been in training since Nov. 1. Coach John Egli says his squad will be at full strength for the first time next week.

Geczy Ill, But Will Still Play Against Temple

A dark curtain that draped Penn State's soccer hopes for winning its seventh straight contest today against Temple was raised yesterday when goalie George Geczy left the University Hospital after a week-long battle with tonsillitis.

Geczy, a junior, was ill when he played one of his best games last week as the Lions dumped Navy, 2-0. "Geczy was playing with a severe sore throat and a temperature of 102 degrees," Coach Ken Hosterman said.

Although Geczy left yesterday with the team for Philadelphia, he was still very weak after not being able to eat properly for five days.

Lawrence Loss Hurt

The goal-tending position has been the only weak link in Hosterman's chain this fall for heavy duty performance. At the start of the campaign, John Lawrence, a versatile junior goal-tender was lost to Hosterman because of scholastic standing.

During the Lions' last six wins Geczy has played a full 66 minutes in each encounter. Hosterman has had several "benchwarmers" for a last minute replacement in a major emergency, but his second-string goalies need much more practice-game experience before Hosterman counts on them for game-time duty.

Matacia Will Be Ready

Dick Matacia, junior lineman, was the only other soccerman that came close to the injured list this week. Matacia suffered a slightly sprained ankle but Hosterman said the classy booter took part in Thursday's scrimmage and would be ready for today's contest.

Temple (6-0-1) and Penn State (6-0) both own impressive win

streaks, although the Owls hold the edge in that department with an 18-game victory chart.

Last Tuesday Temple dropped Lafayette 4-0 for its sixth win of the season. The lineup for the Owls, however, against Lafayette showed that Al Didriksen, one of the top scoring pacers for the Owls, did not play. If Pete Leanness' Didriksen has also been sidelined for the Lion contest, Penn State will have one less worry.

Leanness has a hatful of tricks and a fistful of slick players. All-Americans Len Oliver, and Jack Dunn backed by Bob Lamey, center half, are bound to have some surprises for Hosterman's soccer hotshots.

Phi Delts, Fireballs Are IM Grid Kings

Phi Delta Theta and the Fireballs reign as Intramural independent and fraternity champions following their wins over Delta Sigma Phi and Dorm 27 last night at Beaver Field. Phi Delt beat Delta Sig, 1-0, and the Fireballs defeated Dorm 27, 12-0.

In the fraternity battle, Phi Delta Theta edged by Delta Sig on the last play of a sudden death period. The contest ended with the score 0-0 and first downs at one all.

On the first play in the overtime Frank DiSalle threw to Dave Hubert for a 4-yard gain. Delta Sigma's next two plays were foiled by the onrushing lineman of Phi Delt. It was DiSalle again as he raced 10 yards to the 36-yard line of Delta Sigma Phi and from there Phi Delt held and won the game.

Delta Sig First Down

Delta Sigma Phi scored its first down on a 40-yard pass play going from Joe Murphy to Garry Gehrig. On the second play of the second half, Phi Delt tied it up when a DiSalle-to-Bill Kutz-to-Ed Seiling pass went for 40 yards and the first down.

The game was marred with many fumbles and flareups between the players, and also great defensive play. Ron Fiegles, Phi Delta Theta, and Jack Grenier, Delta Sigma Phi, were the outstanding linemen of the game.

Fireballs Win 4th Title

In the second game the Fireballs extended their victory streak to 23 straight as they racked up their fourth straight independent championship. Their skein first started in 1951.

On the fourth play of the first half Walt Laska threw to John Pepe on a sleeper play for 42 yards and a first down for the only action in the half. In the second half the Fireballs showed their championship form as they scored twice on dazzling runs.

Pepe, Laska Star

Dorm 27, after being held on downs, punted to the Fireballs' 40-yard line where Pepe grabbed it, raced in between two men, and cut for the sidelines, outmaneuvering three men in doing it: he then threw to Walt Laska on the 20-yard line and Laska dashed down the sidelines to score. The extra point attempt failed. The second TD was almost as

spectacular, as Chick Young picked off an enemy pass on his own 17 and ran 30 yards before he threw it to Jim Coleman who in turn tossed it to Jim Pastorius. Pastorius outlegged the defensive backs to his 20 yard line where he finally was caught.

Williams Scores TD

But on the very next play the fired-up Fireballs scored again when Chick Young threw a bullet pass to Bob Williams who was standing on the 2-yard line and just crossed over for the marker.

Dorm '27's only threat came in the waning moments of the game when Chuck Rine's pass to Glenn Spaid was good for a first down on their own 45. And on the next play an interference penalty against the Fireballs put the ball on the letters' 20.

But the Fireballs stalled this drive when Chick Young intercepted a pass. The Fireballs then held the ball until time ran out.

Frosh Finish Unbeaten

Penn State's freshman football team was unbeaten, although tied by Pitt and winner over Navy by a single point. Bullis Academy bowed in the final game, 19-6.
