 a report declaring MacRae was "not a subversive person."
 MacRae was then reinstated by the University in December, 1952, when the executive board of the University Board of Trustees decided he was "completely loyal."
 The Academic Freedom Committee said MacRae was cited because of his "position in refusing to fill out a loyalty questionnaire and . . . exposition of his principles for such refusal (which) led to improved academic due process at his college and seriously tested the basic philosophy of the Pechan Act in Pennsylvania."
 Stoddard was cited by the committee for persisting even to the point of discharge from position as president of the University of Illinois in resisting political interference in matters of educational policy.
 Others cited by the committee were John A. Mackay, president of Princeton Theological Seminary; Robert M. Hutchins, president of the Fund for the Republic; Walter Van Tilburg Clark, author and lecturer in English at the University of Nevada; and the Very Reverend James A. Pike, dean of the Cathedral of Saint John the Devine in New York.
 Rev. Pike spoke before Chapel earlier this semester. He was cited for refusing to deliver a baccalaureate address and to accept an honorary degree at the University of the South, because of that institution's discriminatory policy.


