

Lowell to Address Chapel Tomorrow

The Rev. C. Stanley Lowell, minister of the Methodist Church, Virginia Beach, Va., will speak on "Arranged in Tears" at the Chapel service at 10:55 a.m. tomorrow in Schwab Auditorium.

Music for the services will include the anthem, "Almighty Word"

(Tallis-Williams-Scott), by the Chapel Choir, directed by Mrs. Willa C. Taylor.

For the prelude, George E. Ceiga, organist, will play "Let All Together Praise Our God" and "Saviour of the Heathen, Come," both by J. S. Bach. For the postlude, he will play "In Thee is Joy," also by Bach.

A native of Minnesota, the Reverend Lowell completed his undergraduate studies at Asbury

College, Wilmore, Ky., received his master's degree from Duke University, and later was graduated from the Yale Divinity School.

Began in Florida

The Reverend Lowell began his ministry in Miami, Fla., as pastor of the Tamiami Temple for six years. He then became pastor of the Atonement Methodist Church, Wilmington, Del., and after serving as a chaplain with the Navy, was named pastor of Wesley Methodist Church, Washington, D.C. He became pastor of the Methodist Church at Virginia Beach July 1.

In Washington, the Reverend Lowell served as president of the Chevy Chase Ministers' Council and as a member of the board of the Washington Federation of Churches and chairman of its Commission in Public Services. He served the Peninsular Conference of the church as a member of the Commission on World Services and Finance and the Baltimore Conference as a member of the Commission on Evangelism.

Author of Merger

The Reverend Lowell has contributed to numerous religious magazines and is author of a plan for merger of the Methodist and Protestant Episcopal Churches which has received wide attention.
