Ralph Marterie will provide the music for the military formal which will be held tomorrow night from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. in Recreation Hall. Coeds will receive special permission for the dance. Upperclasswomen will receive two o'clocks Friday night, and freshman women will receive one twelve and one one o'clock permissions for the weekend.

The newly formed Angel-Flight will make its first formal appearance during intermission of the Military Ball. Members will wear white sashes.

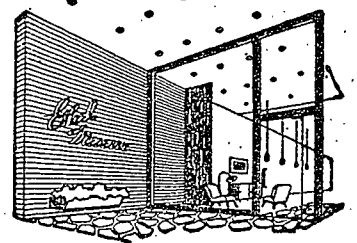
The WRA executive board has designated March 12 as Spring Sports Day. Patricia Farrell was appointed chairman of the event.

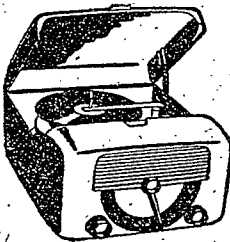

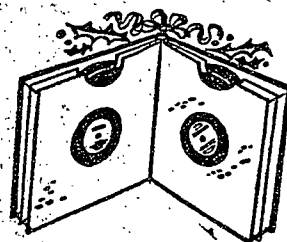
