

IFC OK's New Code For Rushing

Interfraternity Council last night unanimously approved a revised rushing code which will take effect immediately.

The four major revisions in the new code are:

1. Rushes may live in fraternity houses only during Orientation Week except in cases to be determined by the IFC Board of Control. The exception was not originally included in the revisions, but was added so that upperclassmen eligible to be pledged who did not have a housing contract with the University could live in a fraternity house until the official pledging date.

Under the old code a fraternity could invite an upperclassman to live in the house under conditions stipulated by the house. There was no limit set on the time a man could live in the house.

2. If a house fails to appear before the Board of Control when it is called, it is considered a plea of guilty and the house forfeits its right to appeal.

3. In order for the board to reconsider a case, a house must present a petition signed by 51 percent of the member houses of IFC. A further appeal may also be made on the floor of IFC after the board reconsiders the case. A decision may be reversed by a 2/3 vote. Under the old code houses appealed directly to IFC.

4. The setting of a time limit of two weeks for receiving the pledge slips and \$2 fee which a house must submit to IFC for each pledge. No pledge can be recognized until this fee has been received.

Organizations writing for the book include American Airlines, Inc., Firestone Fire and Rubber Co., and Western Electric Co.

Although the volume will be of special interest to seniors in the colleges of Business Administration, Liberal Arts, Engineering and Architecture, Chemistry and Physics, and Mineral Industries, seniors in other colleges may also acquire copies by signing for them at the distribution points.

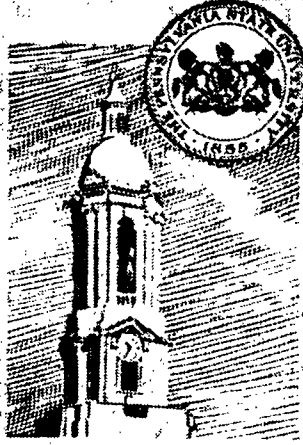

PENN STATE CENTENNIAL

Chartered as the Farmers' High School on Feb. 22, 1855, The Pennsylvania State University was one of the early Land-Grant institutions to benefit under the Morrill Act of 1862. This act granted to individual states lands to be sold for the aid of Southern colleges and the maintenance of colleges to teach agriculture and the mechanic arts. From these funds Pennsylvania State has grown to rank 11th in the nation in enrollment.
