

# AIM Progress Told To Pollock Council

Pollock Council last night heard a progress report from Robert Dennis, president of the Association of Independent Men, on the progress of AIM during the past semester.

Dennis said he believed that AIM had "a successful semester" and that its future was bright. He believed that AIM's best accomplishment in the past year was the establishment of the AIM Judicial Board of Review. Dennis explained the functioning of the board to the council.

The Association of Independent Men, Dennis said, which serves 75 per cent of the undergraduate men at the University, also expanded its social program this past year.

Dennis stated that progress was also made in improving relations with the administration and especially with the Dean of Men's Office.

Legislative improvements for AIM included a new elections code, and a new budget and finance committee, Dennis said.

Dennis informed the council that the University had replaced Cornell as the top independent men's organization in the east.

Copies of the newly proposed constitution for AIM were given to council members by Dennis. Pollock Council President Carl Polley, said that action on the constitution will be taken at the next meeting of the council. Polley explained to council members that it was necessary for all four councils to ratify the proposed constitution.

Polley announced that an election will be held at the next meeting of the council to fill the offices of president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer.

In other action of the council complaints were made by several council members about the heating system in the Pollock area. One council member produced a thermograph reading which gave the temperature of one of the rooms in Pollock. The reading, which was made at table level height, gave the average room temperature for one night as 52 degrees.

The heating the past weekend was said to have been exceedingly

bad. No immediate action was taken on this problem.

The council also discussed challenging the women to do something to celebrate the centennial at the University. This matter will be turned over to the new projects committee which will be appointed in the near future, Polley said.

A committee of four, to be appointed at a later date, will investigate the condition of recording apparatus and the purchasing of records for the Pollock dining hall.

Announcement was made of dance to be held for council members at 8:30 p.m. Friday in the West Dorm lounge.

The dance, which will be semi-formal, is sponsored by the Dean of Men and the councils.

Fink said he would have liked to have seen action on some of the specific grievances presented to the panel. However, he said he felt that these could be worked out on the basis of the recommendations which were handed down.

Kenneth Dixon, president of Local 417 Building Service Employees International (AFL), could not be reached for comment last night.

The panel began work last August after employees invoked a Pennsylvania statute which permits employees to request a grievance panel.

The full report of the panel will be sent to Gov. George M. Leader, the General Assembly, and President Milton S. Eisenhower.

Panel members are Saul Wallen, chairman and president of the National Academy of Arbitrators; Sidney Handler, Harrisburg attorney, representing the unions; and Eric A. Walker, representing the University.

(Continued from page one) made in Missouri, only one criminal in 10 was caught for committing a crime, Hepbrun said.

Hepbrun called for putting men of high character and integrity in magistrates positions. He said that this is necessary because 95 percent of all those arrested are brought before a magistrates' court and gauge our system by what they see there.

He also called for a method of selecting juries which would give a true cross section of the population. He cited the English system of selection, where names of 12 qualified persons are simply picked out of a hat to constitute the jury, each having been carefully investigated beforehand.

Hepbrun advocated an improvement in the probation system. As an example of the inefficiency which he said existed in some places, he cited a recent study in Baltimore which showed that out of 304 persons paroled, 109 were arrested 343 times over a period of one year and nine months.

"Probation administered by political hacks is an adjunct to crime," he said, "but if it is administered properly, it is the right hand of justice."
