

Kentucky Blasts Lions, 84-59

Arnelle Leads Cagers In Final NCAA Contest

The Penn State basketball team, jarred rudely by Iowa Friday night, suffered its second defeat in the National Collegiate Athletic Association Saturday in the consolation round of the regional finals at Evanston, Illinois.

The Lions dropped an 84-59 verdict to a favored University of Kentucky quintet.

Although they showed more fight against the Wildcats than against the Hawkeyes on the previous night, the Lions were never in contention, even with center Jesse Arnelle back in form after a poor showing against Iowa. The Lion

But even with Arnelle hitting again, the Nittanies found themselves outmanned by coach Adolph Rupp's team which had been upset by Marquette in the opening round.

The Wildcats, ranked second in the nation by the Associated Press, opened fast and piled on a 6-0 lead before Arnelle scored on a driving layup to make the score 6-2.

The Lions played the Kentuckians even throughout most of the first half and trailed 13-11 with seven minutes remaining. Then the Wildcats, led by Bob Burrow, began to pull away and led by 12 points, 40-28, at intermission.

Cats Open Quickly

The Wildcats, however, opened quickly in the second half and used a good outside shooting game to build their lead to 49-32. The Lions battled back briefly and

Weidenhammer Gets 16

Arnelle and Ron Weidenhammer, who wound up with 16 Lion points, kept the Nittany offense alive but it wasn't enough to match the red hot Kentuckians. Four of Rupp's starters—Jerry Bird, Gerry Calvert, John Brewer, and Burrow—reached the double figures in the scoring column. Burrow was the top man with

22 points while Calvert trailed closely with 19. Bird had 17 and Brewer notched 11.

The loss brought Penn State's season record to 18-10. The Lions were 17-8 on the regular schedule and were victors in one of three tournament games.
