

### Plans Made For BusAd Open House

The Business Administration Student Council Tuesday night discussed plans for Business Administration Open House to be held as part of the combined college open house on April 23.

Ralph H. Wherry, head of the department of commerce, will speak on the different departments of the College of Business Administration and introduce a half-hour film, "This Is Penn State" George Leetch, director of the University placement service, will discuss the job opportunities available to students after graduation.

Following the speeches a mixer will be held in the Hetzel Union Building for the high school students.

Council decided to publish the final issue of the Biz-Ad-Bulletin on April 23 so copies of it can be given to the students.

April 19 was set as the date for the election of next year's officers.

It was explained that impeachment proceedings could be initiated by any member of Cabinet.

In speaking against the amendment, Benjamin Sinclair, chairman of the Board of Dramatics and Forensics, said that the proposal was a "danger" to the reputation of All-University officers. He said that an irresponsible student could ruin an officer's reputation by maliciously initiating charges against him regardless of whether they were carried out. Sinclair stated that the adverse publicity could endanger an officer's reputation.

In other action, Cabinet passed one amendment, delayed action on another, and defeated a third, presented by Ross Clark, chairman of Tribunal. His first was to permit students to appeal to Tribunal decisions of Traffic Court only on the basis of an unfair trial. Previously, students could appeal these decisions to Tribunal for any reason.

Clark's second proposal was to put 50 per cent of the fines collected by Traffic Court into Cabinet's student scholarship fund. Previously it had been put in a

fund for the construction of student parking areas. The group delayed action on the matter until further information could be obtained.

Frank J. Simes, dean of men, explained that the University Physical Plant did not wish to use the money provided by the fines. He stated that they had never used the money and that it had been put into the Associated Student Activities fund.

Clark's final proposal, to remove from the constitution the requirement that Cabinet approve all appointments to Tribunal, was defeated. It was also defeated in last week's meeting.

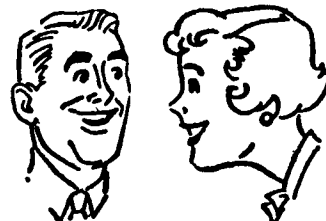
