Cabinet Seat Ratio Approved

An amendment to the All-University elections code which would stipulate that the five All-University Cabinet seats elected each spring will go to fraternity and independent men at a 3 to 2 ratio was approved by All-University Elections Committee on Thursday night.

Three independents and two fraternity men will fill the seats one year and three fraternity men and two independents the next.

This amendment will replace the unwritten agreement which stipulates that offices will rotate between fraternity men and independent men each year.

The clause that no fraternity man may oppose an independent man in an election will still hold for offices which do not have seats on Cabinet.

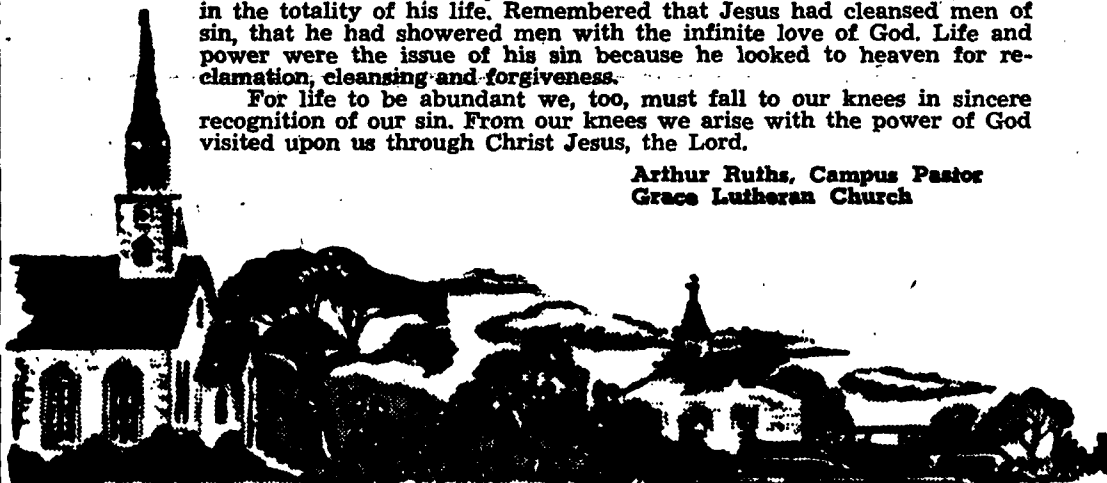
Both had sinned grievously. Yet the issue of the matter in each case differed from the other.
