to "ride this revolution" to strengthen Southeast Asia.

He said the United States can help by both political and economic measures. He cited two political measures:

1. To continue deterring Red China from armed aggression as we have in the past.
2. To encourage neutral nations such as India and Burma to reach Chinese leaders with the message that the United States will not stand for armed aggression in Asia.

Economic help can best be given through programs such as farm extension services, training doctors and nurses for public health clinics, and the training of police forces, Kuhn stated.

He also said the people of the United States must discard the notion that they are superior.
