

Gallagher Is Queen; May Court Named

Faith Gallagher, eighth semester arts and letters major, will be crowned 1955 May Queen during the annual ceremonies May 7 on the lawn in front of Old Main. Freshman Maid of Honor will be Katherine Dickson.

Miss Gallagher was junior attendant in the May Court last year and was Junior Prom Queen. She was a member of Freshman Council and is senior class secretary-treasurer. She is social chairman of Delta Gamma, and chairman of the senior class gift committee.

Approximately 1086 women voted yesterday in the elections sponsored by the Women's Student Government Association House of Representatives. Nancy Scofield, eighth semester education major, and Rosemary Short, eighth semester arts and letters major, finalists for May Queen, will serve as senior attendants.

Eleanore Woodward, second semester home economics major, and Avis Dunkelberger, second semester home economics major, runners-up for Maid of Honor, will be freshman attendants.

Junior attendants are Cecilia Yarnall and Mary Ann Spangler, sixth semester home economics majors.

Sandra Stover, fourth semester education major, and Anne Cain, fourth semester applied arts major, are sophomore attendants. Junior and sophomore attendants were elected in the primaries Tuesday.

The number of votes received by each candidate was not released. The elections committee said, "The May Day committee will not release the votes because this is an election of a different calibre than WSGA Senate or WRA elections in that entirely different qualifications are considered in each. Candidates for WSGA and WRA are self-nominated, whereas May Queen candidates are nominated through dormitory units. It has not been the policy in previous years to release May Day results."

Charlotte Klippel, sixth semester physical education major, and Patricia Olkkonen, seventh semester recreation major, will act as jesters for the May Court.

Ceremonies for the thirty-second May Day will honor past May Queens of the University and past WSGA presidents.

The tentative program is (1) the welcome to parents, friends and guests; (2) the processional, with the hemlock chain and the honor arch participation; (3) the presentation of the crown, scepter, and the world to the queen; (4) folk dances; (5) the May Pole dance; and (6) the recessional.

Senior girls interested in being part of the Hemlock Chain should call Ann Bebbe, 55 Atherton. The deadline for signing up for the Hemlock Chain is April 4.

The members of the May Court will meet next week.

Air Force To Sponsor New Course

The department of air science will sponsor a six weeks course, "The Life of the Service Wife," for women who are, or who are planning to be, wives of men serving in the Air Force.

The course will begin at 7:10 p.m. April 13 in 110 Electrical Engineering. The first discussion will be "The Armed Forces," an orientation to the course. Defense functions, service customs and courtesies, and matters pertaining to rank will be discussed.

"Base Living" will be the topic on April 20. Security measures, job opportunities, and special services and activities will be explained.

"Socializing" is the topic for the third class, to be held April 27. A general picture of base communities and formal and informal entertaining will be presented.

Orders, processing, packing and shipping facilities for household effects, and transportation and travel will be discussed on May 4.

The topic will be "Overseas" on May 11. This program will explain relationships with citizens of other countries and educational and travel facilities abroad.

The final class discussion will be "Personal Affairs," which will explain pay and allowances, allotments, and insurance and retirement plans of the Air Force.

The course will be conducted on a non-fee, non-credit basis. Women interested in attending have been requested to call University extensions 2610 or 2639 to register.

Miss Schleman received her B.S. degree from Northwestern University, an M.S. from Wellesley College, and a second M.S. degree from Purdue University.

During World War II, Miss Schleman served as a captain in the Coast Guard. She was also director of the Women's Reserve.

She was an instructor at Ohio State University, and has been director of residence halls for women at Purdue University. She became dean of women at Purdue in 1947.

Miss Schleman has also been in charge of a housemothers' summer training program at Purdue University. Several local fraternity housemothers have attended the program.

She is national vice president of Alpha Lambda Delta, freshman women's scholastic honor society, and a member of Mortar Board, senior women's honor society.

Miss Schleman is co-author of "Your Best Foot Forward," an etiquette book for college freshmen.
