written into the constitution last night stipulates that a brief must first be drawn by a Cabinet member and presented to Cabinet sitting in executive session. The public is not allowed to witness actions taken by groups in executive session.

The brief must be adopted by a majority of Cabinet.

The chairman of Tribunal will chair the meeting during the trial of the All-University president.

A two-thirds vote will be needed to find the president guilty of embezzlement, malfeasance in office or action contrary to or in violation of the Constitution.

Cabinet decided All-University presidential candidates must have a 1.3 average to run, but candidates for vice president or secretary treasurer need only 1.00 averages.

Cabinet stripped future members of the group of the power to approve the budgets and expenditures of the groups represented on Cabinet. But it retained its power to pass on new fees before they are presented to the University Board of Trustees.

In discussing Cabinet's power to approve the financial matters of its represented groups, Dean of Women Pearl O. Weston said that Women's Student Government Association gets its authority "directly from the Board of Trustees," and not from Cabinet.

## Greek Week Fees Are Due Today

Today is the deadline for fraternities and sororities to pay the Greek Week fee, Vernon Sones, Greek Week chairman, has announced.

The fee, payable by check, is due at the Hetzel Union desk in the HUB by 5 p.m. Checks should be made payable to the Interfraternity Council.

The fee, \$11 for sororities and \$17 for fraternities, will be used to pay the cost of the Greek Week banquets and booklet.

over the 133 votes received by Sue Conway, fourth semester education major. Anne Nitrauer, second semester education major, received 211 votes to 198 for Mary Lockwood, second semester home economics major, for sophomore senator.

Town senator is Jane Patton, sixth semester music education major, over Ann Farrell, fourth semester physical education major. They received 13 and 9 votes respectively.

Sara Cushman, fourth semester physical education major, received 637 votes to become WRA vice president over Susan Walker, who had 365 votes.

WRA secretary-treasurer is Mary Conrad, second semester recreation education major, who received 653 votes to 440 for Mary Mertz, second semester education major.

Ann Forster, fourth semester home economics major, was elected intramurals chairman over Elizabeth Morrill, fourth semester labor management major. Miss Forster received 561 votes to Miss Morrill's 445.

Assistant intramurals chairman is Patricia Barnitz, who received 545 votes to 429 votes for Patricia Miller, second semester applied arts major. Myrna Paynter, second semester education major, was elected WRA sophomore representative with 230 votes, over Joan Brown, second semester physical education major, who received 221 votes.

ped because it is impractical in the opinion of Captain Philip A. Mark of the campus patrol, Hess said.

The idea is contained in the State party platform.

Cabinet also defeated an amendment to allow clique chairman to be members of the All-University Elections Committee.

Ernest Famous, chairman of the Election Committee, first presented the amendment to the Election Code to make clique chairman voting members of the committee. It was defeated, even with a change to make them non-voting, ex-officio members.

In reply to a question, Famous stated that the function of the Committee is to be a regulatory body of the political parties. Robert

Dennis, president of the Association of Independent Men, said he felt that it was the same as having the defendant sitting on his own jury.

Famous explained that at present, the clique chairmen are invited to attend and express their opinions at Committee meetings, when benefit would be had by both groups.

Three of the five offices in the spring elections may not be filled by students of the same affiliation, either fraternity or independent, as result of an amendment passed by Cabinet last night.
