

72 Groups Enter 'Week' Categories

Forty fraternities, 21 sororities, and 11 independent groups are entering Spring Week under the four categories specified by the Spring Week Committee.

The four categories are Farmer's High School, Agricultural College, Penn State College, and Penn State University. These divisions apply to the Spring Week parade and carnival only.

University To Improve Power Plant

The General State Authority in Harrisburg yesterday received bids for the completion of the final phase of the expansion and improvement of the steam generation and electrical distribution systems at the University.

The project will include the construction of a new three-story shop area inside the present Power Plant and new walk-ways, platforms, stairs, handrails, and other installations.

Construction of a new driveway from the Power Plant to College avenue also is included in the project.

A new boiler for the Nittany Dorms area is planned and changes will be made in the stack of this plant. Some underground steam lines in the area also will be replaced with larger lines.

Normal use of the utilities will be maintained during construction, according to University officials. Mid-April, 1956, is the scheduled completion date.

General construction, Wilson Construction Co., Inc., Johnstown, \$12,400; heating, John F. Miles, Kulpmont, \$31,000; plumbing, Mulch Brothers, Hollidaysburg, \$2832; and electrical construction, Michael Electrical Contractors, Bellefonte, \$4750.

Chapel Sets Palm Sunday Music Service

The Pergolesi "Stabat Mater" will be sung by the Women's Chorus under the direction of Raymond H. Brown, assistant professor of music. Fifty members of the Chapel choir will sing the Introit and musical responses for the service.

Brown, a native of North Carolina, was graduated from the Peabody Conservatory of Music, Baltimore, Md. Before coming to the University in 1954, he was a television and radio instructor for concerts and solo performances.

George E. Celga, Chapel organist, will play "Da Jesus an dem Kreuze standt," (Sheift) "O Lam Gottes, unschuldig," (Bach), and "Leibster Jesu" from "Hymn Meditation" by Clokey.

The service will be conducted by The Rev. Luther H. Harshbarger, University chaplain.

Air Seniors Take Over For Officers

Senior cadets in the Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps are participating this week in a special training program.

They are observing the duties and functions of several of the senior officers in the department. Each senior cadet will spend at least two hours this week not only watching the officers do their routine work but also taking over the jobs themselves.

The cadets sit behind the officers' desks for part of their two-hour periods making any decisions and recommendations that ordinarily are made by the officers.

The program, which is being scheduled for the first time at the University, is designed to better acquaint the cadets with the officers' jobs.

Familiarization with typical Air Force administrative procedures and regulations will aid students in practicing general staff duties when they receive their commissions, Capt. Howard F. O'Neal said.

An exhibition of four projects, including plans and drawing of flexible theaters for small colleges are being shown in the Green Room now through April 4.

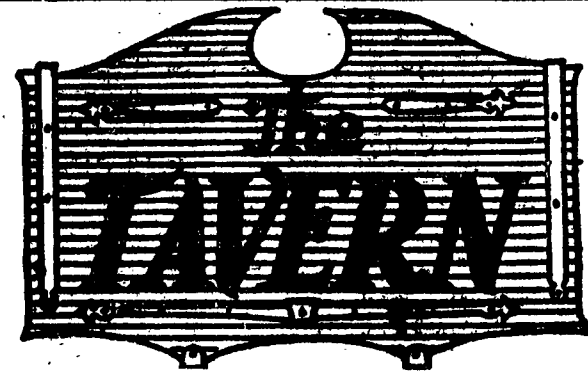
The projects were designed by architecture students for a national beaux arts prize competition.
